"THE BIG SECRET", by Merle Colby--

Here is a book that all members of The Association of Brookhaven Scientists will want to read. An atomic novel, the story of a young scientist who inadvertantly is drawn into battle with Washington officials and others who plan to capture the use of atomic energy for commercial exploitation rather than for the public good.

Daniel Upstead, a research scientist from a small college in Maine, goes to Washington to hear a speech by a leading physicist, only to learn that the subject matter has been termed "classified" and the speech cancelled. Daniel determines to seek an interview with the President for just five minutes to tell him how important it is that scientists be free to pursue their research wherever it leads and communicate their findings to each other.

Powerful interests are working to have the President sign an Executive Order that will bottle up all scientific information and Daniel is tripped up by red tape, offered bribes in the form of jobs or research grants and even accused of disloyalty and called to testify before a committee investigation unAmericanism.

Daniel's experiences as he encounters lobbyists, generals, witch hunters, social leaders, newspaper men and other Washington habitues, make an interesting tale.
