LAWN SEED AND FERTILIZER AT DISCOUNT

Arrangements have been made by BERA to obtain lawn seed and fertilizer from the Swan River Nursery at a considerable discount. Both the seed and the fertilizer are formulas recommended for this area by E.J. Hunter, leader of the Maintenance Grounds Group. The grass contains 85^{7/} Ilahee fescue and 15% Kentucky Blue and the fertilizer is a 10-6-4 mixture.

Orders, accompanied by payment in full, may be placed at the Recreation Office in the Gymnasium for seed in 5-lb. units or for fertilizer in 100-lb. bags from Sept. 12 to 16. All purchases will be delivered to the individual buyer at the Nursery on Montauk Highway, east of Patchogue and may be picked up on September 22, 23 or 24.

The Swan River Nursery has also announced that they will allow BERA members to purchase garden equipment and shrubbery at figures helow the retail cost.

BOOKS CN BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVE**S**

In "TOMORROW WE REAP", James Street and James Childers have fashioned an exciting, fast-moving tale of love and adventure in the South that has earned the book a place well up near the top of all best-seller lists.

This story, the fourth and last about the Dabney family of Lebanon Valley, Mississippi, is set in the 1890's and illustrates the struggle of the tradition bound South against the invasion of Northern capital and modern methods.

When the Peninsula Lumber Company starts operations in the Valley, big Sans Dabney, the eldest son, refuses to sell them a right-of-way for their company railroad and tries unsuccessfully to compete with their modern machinery by the same methods that he has used for years.

Blocked, temporarily in their efforts to bring their railroad into town, Peninsula, through the power of their money, succeed in subsidizing several local politicians, not realizing that the type of person they are "buying" will run with the fox as well as the hounds.

Romance is supplied through Sans affair with Louisa Woodward, who wanted both brothers, and his love for Ruth Thrumbull, the daughter of the Peninsula Lumber Company's local manager, and Mingo's love for Rafaela Torres, the Cuban beauty who came to town to seek aid for the Cuban revolutionists.
