YOUR BERA TRUSTEES

Alex A. Schultz is BERA representative for District No. 6, which covers the Buildings and Grounds Division. Alex was born in Sayville, L.I., and graduated from the Sayville High School. For 25 years he conducted his own plumbing and heating business in Sayville and became a civilian employee of the Army at Camp Upton in 1942. When the Laboratory took over the operation of the site, Alex became supervisor of the Plumbing Shop, which is responsible, among other things, for the proper operation of the water supply and sewer systems.

Fire-fighting is Alex's particular hobby and he has been a member of the Sayville Fire Department since the days when they had hand-drawn fire apparatus, 35 years ago.
