BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"INNER HARBOR", by Frederick Wight --(Reviewed by Eleanor deLaguna)

Mr. Wight's tale is concerned with the psychological renascence of a young socialite, Christine Brainford. Christine is a sensitive person, entangled in a web of relationships with her family, none of whom is willing to see her free of their neurotic claims. Her brother, Adrian, is jealous of her outside interests. Her mother, despite a succession of lovers, disapproves of any man in whom Christine is interested. Even the memory of Charlie, Christine's dead brother, confines her emotional interests to the family.

Further demands are made by the two men in love with her: Dan Edwards, a boat designer and builder, and Dr. Rinehardt, the psychoanalyst who is helping her to understand her family problems. The action includes some violence brought about in the psychological development of all the main figures.

Mr. Wight lays the scene for his story in a believable Cape Cod community, where the conflict between the native fishermen and the summer colony counterpoints the main plot. You will be happy to realize that no one says "I swan", or "Heavens to Betsy". Mr. Wight does not indulge in deathless prose, but he has a nice ear for conversation.

R.O.A. SECURES TRAINING UNIT FOR AIR FORCE PERSONNEL

The East Suffolk County Chapter of the Reserve Officers' Association announced this week the formation of a training unit for Air Force personnel, tentatively to operate in Riverhead.

The unit has been designated as Flight A of the 9200 V.A.R.T. Squadron, whose headquarters will be located in Hempstead, while the group officers are at 67 Broad Street, New York. This unit will enable all qualified officers and enlisted personnel the opportunity to secure training which will give them credits toward the maintaining of their military status in the reserve, retirement pay benefits and promotion opportunities, and it will also act as a pool from which appointments can be made to T.O.&E. Units that provide monthly pay for training. Other flights have been established in Huntington and Hempstead.

Information on an Army Training & Pay Unit at Riverhead will be available shortly; the unit has been definitely authorized but details are lacking.

LAB. K-9'S SCORE AT RYE SHOW by Hazel Fenny

On Sunday, Sept. 11, and Charles Winifred (Pip) Goldman (Medical) and Hazel (Medical) and Don Penny (Physics), attended the Westchester County Kennel Show at Rye, New York, where their dogs were entered for the first time in a Novice Chedience trial. All three dogs were trained at the dog obedience classes held here last spring.

In order to obtain their C.D. (Companion Dog) rating, a dog is required to obtain a score of 170 out of a possible 200 points in three shows under at least two different judges. When the results were in we were pleasantly surprised to find that Fip's dog (a Springer Spaniel), Gay Baron of Pheasantdale (alias Butch) had obtained a score of 190, Winnie's Springer, Gay Dutchess of Pheasantdale, 185, and Hazel Penny's Woodland Flicka (Cocker Spaniel), 175. Flicka, 10-1/2 months old, was the youngest qualifying dog out of 62 entries.

In addition to the above, Dutchess walked off with a blue ribbon for breed and Don's Doberman Pinscher, Baroness von Ruelson, came home with a trophy, a cash award and a second place ribbon.

On the 24th and 25th of Sept. all of the dogs were again entered in the Long Island Shows at Huntington and Westbury, where it was hoped they would obtain their C. D.
