TWO MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

The appointment of Dr. William Mason Hale as Head of the Bacteriology and Virology Division and Dr. Sidney C. Madden as Head of the Pathology Division of the Depart-Medicine of at ment Brookhaven National Laboratory, was announced Thursday, Sept. 29, by Dr. Leland J. Haworth, director.

Dr. Hale was formerly professor and head of the Department of Bacteriology of the College of Medicine at the State University, where he served from 1929 to 1938.

Well known for his work in basic fields of immunology, Dr. Hale has had numerous scientific papers published and during World War II was a consultant to the Secretary of War as a member of the Influenza Commission of the Army Epidemiological Board. He was at one time Head of the Bacteriology Division of the National Board of Medical Examiners.

A native of Nashville, Arkansas, Dr. Hale received his Bachelor of Science degree from the University of New Mexico in 1924 and his Doctorate in Medicine from Yale University in 1929.

Prior to his appointment to the Brookhaven staff, Dr. Madden was Professor and Chairman of the Department of Pathology at

the University of Rochester.

Dr. Madden's research work has been concerned with the factors controlling the production of new blood and new tissue proteins. These studies have presented the influences of food constituents, of diet imbalances and of disease upon the construction of body proteins.

Dr. Madden received the Theobald Smith Award of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 1941. He is secretarytreasurer of the American Society for Experimental Pathology, member of the Pathology Study Section of the United States Public Health Service, as well as of other pathology and clinical research societies. He is also a member of the editorial committee of the Annual Review of Medicine.

Born in Fresno, California, Dr. Madden is a graduate of Stanford University and of its Medical School, from which he received his Doctorate in 1934.

At Brookhaven, both Dr. Hale and Dr. Madden will have an opportunity to apply the techniques and tools peculiar to nuclear science to their respective fields of research.

BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"LIVE WITH LIGHT-NING", by Mitchell Wilson--

Here is a book that most scientists will be interested in reading. To quote Lisle Bell's review in the Herald Tribune, "Live With Lightning is a work of unusual scope, urgency and emotional depth. It sums up a great deal of American life and challenges you to think about it.

"Live With Lightning is evidence of the grossly unfair blindly, unenlightened pushing around that men dedicated to pure science (whose only pride is in the discovery and sharing of truth) have suffered from all the selfish groups who have ganged up on them. As humanity's best hope for a tolerable future they have been accorded about as much dignity as tame rabbits and trained seals."

The story follows the fortunes of Erik Gorin, who began his career in physics at Columbia University. After many bitter experiences as a college instructor, an industrial research scientist and an employee of the Government during World War II, he finally quits to devote himself to the field where a man "could work with dignity and live with himself"--the laboratories of free research.
