A group of flying enthusiasts have banded together to start the BNL Flying Club. Composed almost equally of pilots and novices, the purpose of the Club, as stated in its constitution, is to stimulate and promote economical, safe flying for all its members.

Ground school instruction began last Wednesday on navigation, meteorology, civil air regulations and airplane maintenance. The Club plans to purchase its first airplane in the near future. The airplane will be based at the Mastic Flight Strip immediately south of the Lab. and it is expected that flying will go on right through the Winter.

A small membership contribution covers partial cost of the airplane and insurance. Flying costs will be only \$2.25 per hour to cover cost of gas, oil and maintenance, as opposed to the \$7 or \$8 per hour commercial rental rates.

Trial flights for novices were held Columbus Day, and despite the bumpy air, nearly every passenger flown became a member.

"THE MUDLARK" -- by Theodore Bonnet.

The publicity blurbs on the jackets of most fiction books are so extravagant in their praise that this reader usually disregards them.

The outline of the story on the jacket of "The Mudlark", by Theodore Bonnet is the exception and the reader is not mislead. publisher states. "The Mudlark is a delightful tongue-in-cheek story of a little London ragamuffin and the highly improper disturbance he caused in the reign of Victoria. The astonishing series of events that followed and the amusing characters in and about Windsor Castle who became involved, include an unforgettable portrait of Disraeli himself that is at once charming and unconventional."

Entirely fictional, the story of the waif who sneaked into Windsor Castle, saw Victoria and even sat on the throne, becomes plausible as the plot unfolds. Homer Croy has fashioned a story about English court life that is interesting and amusing from the first word to the last.

## STOP WHEN THE SCHOOL BUS STOPS!

#### BILL FARROTT NEW TENNIS CHAMP

William (Bill) Parrott (Nuclear Reactor), became the 1949 BNL Men's Singles Champion last Monday, when he defeated Karl Hartzell, former champ, 6-3, 1-6, 6-2, before one of the largest groups of specta-

tors that has ever attended a Laboratory athletic event.

A strong cross-court wind made it difficult for the contestants to accurately judge the course of the balls; consequently, there were streaks of brilliant, long drawn out rallies, followed by outs or nets that would not have occurred on a calm day.

Winning the toss, Bill chose to have Karl start service. Both men won their own first services and then Bill took a lead of 3-1 by breaking through in the third game and holding his own in the fourth game. Karl evened the score at 3 all by winning the next two games. Bill won the following three games, breaking through in the seventh and ninth games to take the set at 6-3.

In the second set, which produced the best tennis of the match despite the uneven score, Bill took the first game on his own

service, but in spite of hotly contesting every point, was unable to win any of the next six games and Karl was the winner at 6-1.

In the final and deciding set, Karl won the first game but Bill was not to be denied and took the next four games, dropped his service in the sixth game and then took the next two games to win the set at 6-2 and the match by 2-1.

It is fitting at this time to say a word about Karl Hartzell, 1948 Champ, and Walter Merkle, who played through to the semi-finals, in recognition of the efforts they put forth to make tennis a popular sport at the Laboratory. Karl Walter conducted tennis classes for staff members during the summer and both of them have been prime movers in stirring up interest in tennis and in helping to organize the tennis tournaments.

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
