BOOKS AT REDUCED PRICES

Staff members are offered the opportunity to purchase books of all types at less than retail cost under an arrangement made by BERA.

BERA has become a member of the Dividend Book Club, Inc. of New York City. This membership entitles individual staff members to purchase any books, from any publisher, except those classified by the publisher as text books, at a discount of 25%. On text books, a 15% discount is allowed. The books are original publisher's editions, not book club reprints, and in most cases, are shipped out the day the order is received. If desired, books will be gift-wrapped and a card with the buyer's name and greeting enclosed at no additional cost.

Order forms are available at the Recreation Office. All the prospective buyer need do is fill out the form, enclose a check or money order for the cost of the book, plus 15¢ postage, less the discount, and delivery will be made promptly by mail.

BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"THE MAN WITH THE GOLDEN ARM", by Nelson Algren--

This story of the slums of Chicago is not for sensitive readers. A story of the dregs of humanity, the material in the hands of a lesser writer would be merely sordid, but Nelson Algren manages to impart a certain dignity to the tale of Frankie Machine, stud dealer in a gambling joint, unsuccessfully trying to shake off the drug habit that he acquired as a G.I.

Algren does not emphasize the depravity and sensationalism of the material, but sees his characters as they are--products of birth and environment. The warped and twisted souls are made sympathetic by his treatment. With consummate skill, he lays bare the innermost lives of his characters, their tragedies, their ribald humor and their occasional triumphs.

Stark tragedy runs through the pages of this book, while Frankie and his shadow, Sparrow, whose trade is Lost Dog Finding (actually dog stealing), get in and out of jail. Humor has its place in the story and the reader will enjoy Sparrow's explanations to the police when he is caught in his habitual pilfering.

An unforgettable story.
