Though his only apparent injury was a slight burn on one finger of his right hand, Associate Medical Examiner Leo T. Myles gave electrocution as the cause of death.

'I'm all right, I'm all right,' Mr. Harbury assured fellow students after a flash that abruptly ended his experiment. Seconds later he fell dead.''

BOOKS ON BERA RENTAL LIBRARY SHELVES

"'THE WAY WEST", by A. B. Guthrie, Jr.--

This is not a story fraught with war whoops, scalpings and Indian massacres. But it is an exciting saga of the struggle of a small group of stalwart pioneers, determined to reach a land of new beginnings.

A hundred men, women, and children started out from Independence, Missouri, where the Kaw River joins the Missouri River, seeking the promised land in Oregon.

Some were seeking adventure, some trying to get away from the ills that beset dwellers in the low river area, and some. as one old character remarks, were going "just to get where I ain't.'' And a part of all their reasons was the thought that with Oregon settled by Americans, the British could not assume ownership of that part of the United States. It was a case of, as the author puts it, "Drive, plod, push, tug, turn the wheels, eat dust, damn you. Eat mud. Swim in sweat and freeze at night. Work the sun up. Work it down. Wear the body limp. Keep rolling."

How they won through to their goal, despite seeming unsurmountable obstacles, makes as exciting reading as any adventure story and, as Clifton Fadiman stated, "the finest novel on the subject in existence."
