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DR. FACKENTHAL AND DR. HAWORTH ADDRESS STAFF MEMBERS

Dr. Frank J. Fackenthal, president of Associated Universities, Inc., and Dr. Leland J. Haworth, director of BNL, addressed all of the staff members who could be spared from their duties, at a meeting in the Theatre on December 8, 1949.

Dr. Fackenthal, after being introduced by Dr. Haworth, said that he was glad to be present at the meeting because he and the trustees were very interested members of the Laboratory "family". He said, "The Board of Trustees has full confidence in Dr. Haworth and is pleased with the way he has carried the responsibilities of the directorship."

Dr. Haworth, in opening his address, stated that his talk would be in the nature of an annual progress report to the assembled staff members. He said that good progress was being made in research in the various departments and that greater strides could be taken when the nuclear reactor and accelerators, now under construction, are in operation. The alterations and repairs on the nuclear reactor which, under simulated operating conditions, proved to be necessary, Dr. Haworth stated, were only structural, but had to be done before actual operation could be started. This has delayed its completion several months but it will be ready next year.

Dr. Haworth told the audience that practical applications would not necessarily be the result of the various studies be-

ing carried out at the Laboratory. "Brookhaven National Laboratory,"Dr. Haworth said, "was established for the purpose of pursuing fundamental research, which is a method of investigating and studying the many phases of nature. Practical applications of nuclear energy for beneficial uses may be the result, but are not necessarily the goal of a project of this type."

"We are all in this together," Dr. Haworth continued, "engaged in the pursuit of knowledge about a force that can be of great benefit to mankind. By all working together as a unit we can achieve the best results."

Finally, Dr. Haworth noted that our project is a costly one, to which the A.E.C. is appropriating generous sums of money. He said that we have a duty, and that it is good management to apply this money economically, to advance scientific research.

MAKE IT A MERRY CHRISTMAS! by W. F. Schmelz

With the coming of the Christmas season, a few reminders of the hazards in connection with trees and decorations might well be considered by all.

Christmas trees are fast burning and are usually consumed before extinguishing methods can be brought into play. They have accounted for numcrous tragic holiday fires.

Solutions for flameproofing trees are mainly unsatisfactory according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

Selecta small tree, they are just as decorative and less hazardous.

Tree light wiring that is old should be replaced with new. However, all wiring should be examined carefully, insulation that is frayed or which cracks readily should not be used. Discard wiring having loose or broken sockets.

Do not overload electric circuits by using larger fuses.

Do not have tree lights burning while you are away from home.

Watch for discoloration of the needles near bulbs. If you see that, change the location of the bulbs.

Use metal or glass decorations. Do not, under any circumstances, use paper or cotton on or around the tree.

Dispose of the tree immediately after the holidays; keeping it adds to the hazard.
