# DR. GEORGE B. COLLINS NAMED CHAIRMAN OF ACCELERATOR PROJ.

Lr. George B. Collins, now Chairman of the Lepartment of Physics at the University of Rochester, has been appointed Chairman of the Accelerator Project at BNL, it was announced Thursday, January 12, by Lr. Leland Haworth. Lr. Collins will take the place of Dr. Milton G. White, who has been on part-time leave from Princeton University and who now returns to fill the Higgins Frofessorship in Physics there

Dr. Collins will have charge of all the accelerators now being designed and built at Brookhaven. Included are the multibillion volt proton-syncrotron, or cosmotron, a 3.5 MEV Van de Graaff generator and a 60-in. cyclotron. The two latter machines are of design familiar to experimental physicists. The cosmotron is an entirely new machine of novel design and when completed will enable scientists, for the first time, to produce particles (protons) of energies equivalent to those of some natural cosmic rays. Wuch new knowledge about the nature and structure of matter may result from its use, since never before have scientists had the opportunity to attack the proton itself with energy enough to stand a chance

### of smashing it.

Dr. Collins has been a trustee of Associated Universities, Inc. since 1947. He has relinquished his post at Rochester in order to devote himself to Brookhaven's development and use of the nuclear apparatus and techniques designed to be cooperatively used by research scientists of the northeastern area.

Born in Washington, D.C. in 1906, Dr. Collins attended the University of Maryland for three years and then the Graduate School of The Johns Hopkins University, where he obtained his Fh.D. degree in Physics under the "new plan", which obviated the BS and MS degrees. He was appointed an instructor in physics at Notre Dame University in 1933 and became a full Professor there in 1946.

During World War II he took leave to become a member of the staff of the Radiation Laboratory at M.I.T., where he was Head of the Magnetron Group which contributed to the development of sources of high power micro waves used in short wave-length high resolution radars during the War. In September, 1948, Dr. Collins was awarded the Presidential Certificate of Merit for his outstanding service to the Armed Forces.

In 1946 Dr. Collins was appointed Chairman of the Department of Fhysics at Rochester. One of the major developments there during his stay was completion of the 250 million electron volt cyclotron, which, at the time, was the second largest such machine in the Country. Dr. Collins will assume his new duties in the Spring, as soon as he is able to complete his work at Rochester, and in the meanwhile will serve as consultant to the Brookhaven Accelerator Project. He is a Fellow of the American Physical Society and a member of Phi Beta Kappa and of Sigma Xi, honorary scientific society.

He was married in 1934 to the former Elsa Leser, an instructor in German at Goucher College. They have three children.
