HELP FIGHT POLIO!

The March of Dimes Campaign is underway for 1950 and BNL is anxious to help the drive as much as possible. The money collected during the drive goes to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which in turn helps victims of polio.

It is estimated that 80% of the victims of the polio epidemic last year were aided by the March of Dimes Fund. Effects of the epidemic will also be felt sharply next year, when fully 17,000 patients will need continuing care, in addition to patients from previous years and whatever new cases 1950 brings. The March of Dimes Funds paid salaries, travel expenses and maintenance of more than 2500 nurses recruited by the American Red Cross for emergency duty in 39 states. In addition, the National Foundation rushed 160 physical therapists to epidemic zones, many of them trained under scholarships financed by the March of Dimes.
