LABORATORY NAVAL RESERVE UNIT FORMEL

On Wednesday evening, January 25, U.S. Naval Reserve Volunteer Research Unit 3-9 held its first official meeting here at the Laboratory. The commissioning ceremony was opened when Comdr. Joseph H. Graham, USN, head of the Listrict Cffice of the Research Reserve for the Commandant 3rd Naval District, read the orders activating the Laboratory unit. Comdr. John S. Medd, USNR, then read his orders appointing him as Commanding Officer of this unit.

Dr. Urner Liddell, head of the Nuclear Physics Branch of the Office of Naval Research in Washington, then gave an interesting talk on the organization of research in the Navy. He outlined briefly the scientific problems facing the forces afloat in modern warfare. The part that can be played by each unit, such as that here at the Laboratory, was of considerable interest to all attending. Capt. John T. Tuthill, Jr., the Commandant's Local Representative for Long Island, was present.
