CIVILIAN MOBILIZATION DIRECTOR DISCUSSES ATOMIC DEFENSE TECHNIQUES

Paul J. Larsen, director of the Civilian Mobilization Office of the National Security Resources Board, discussed general aspects of civilian defense here, on April 24.

He met with fifteen scieducators entists and nominated by the governors of ten states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. The scientists and the educators are completing a five-week instructor-training course in detecting radiological effects as part of the civilian defense program of the NSRB. The course was planned and conductedby Dr. J.B.H. Kuper, chairman of the Instrumentation and Health Physics Department and Dr. F. P. Cowan, in charge of the Health Physics Division.

In addition to lectures by members of the Laboratory staff, there were several outside speakers during the course. Dr. Stanley Oughterson of Yale University, discussed atomic air burst bombs and destruction by blast and fire. Major G. M. McDonnel of the Armed (contd. on page 2)

Forces Special Weapons Project described characteristics of ground and underwater bursts and range of damage and exposures for the three types of bursts. Major W. W. Stone of the Army Chemical Center about high explosives, incendiaries and other weapons related to atomic defense, as well as techniques for decontaminating food supplies and buildings of radiological effects.

Other speakers included Dr. A. A. Liebow of Yale University, who reviewed medical aspects of atomic warfare at Hiroshima and Nagasaki. British civilian defense operations during World War II were described by Eric H. Biddle of the NSRB and Horatio Bond, chief engineer of the National Fire Protection Association. Dr. Ernest Pollard of Yale University spoke on radioactivity and the living cell and Dr. H. L. Bowman of the A.E.C., Washdescribed the ington, A.E.C. program in civilian defense.
