CONCERT SERIES TO OPEN WITH CHILDREN'S PROGRAM

The BERA Concert Group this year is presenting a series of five performances and, in addition, a special concert for children, The Children's Concert, to take place on Saturday, October 19, at 10:30 AM, will be given by the New Art Wind Quintet. This group gave a delightful performance here last season and has played extensively in the New York City schools. Admission will be 75 cents per person, regardless of age. Friends of Laboratory employees and their children are invited to take advantage of this unusual occasion.

A group of outstanding artists will give the evening performances of the BERA Series.

October 30 - The Alfred Deller Trio. Mr. Deller has been largely responsible for the recent revival of interest in the counter-tenor voice, a male alto of great range and flexibility. Incidentally this was the voice of Henry Purcell, some of whose music will be heard on this evening. Desmond Dupre, who plays the lute and viola da gamba, and Robert Conant, harpsichordist, will accompany Mr. Deller and also will perform compositions for their instruments.

November 25 - The Barylli String Quartet. We are fortunate in being able to hear this wonderful Viennese quartet on its first tour in the United States. Those who have heard the late Beethoven quartets as recorded by this group will readily understand the enthusiastic reviews of the Barrylli performances in Europe and South America.

January 14 - The Albeneri Trio. This group, put out of action by the death of pianist Erich Itor Kahn, is again performing with the beauty which has come to be expected of it. Mr. Ward Davenny, the present pianist, plays as if he has been a member of the trio for years.

March 11 - Mieczyslaw Horszowski, pianist. Mr. Horszowski has appeared previously at Brookhaven as a soloist and with the violinist Alexander Schneider. He is an artist of international renown, acclaimed for performances with orchestras, with chamber groups, and as a soloist.

April 9 - Jean Erdman. This will be a dance program by Miss Erdman who has studied with such famous teachers as Martha Graham, Charles Weidman, and Doris Humphrey. She performed as a soloist in Martha Graham's company for several years before leaving to start her own company. In addition to her dancing and choreographic work in this country Miss Edman has toured extensively in the Orient.

Performances begin at 8:30 PM and they are given on the Laboratory site. Subscriptions for the series (excluding the Children's Concert) are available at a cost of \$7.50 for adults and \$2.50 for children. Admission to a single concert will cost \$2.00.
