DELLER TRIO TO APPEAR WEDNESDAY

The BERA Concert group will present the Alfred Deller Trio Wednesday evening at 8:30 in the Research Staff Lounge.

Alfred Deller is almost uniquely responsible for the current revival of interest in the counter-tenor voice. This is essentially a male alto voice of exceptional range and facility. Bach and Purcell (himself a Counter-tenor) wrote for this voice in many of their compositions. The distinctive timbre of the counter-tenor voice was a characteristic feature of English vocal music of the 16th and 17th centuries, but by the end of the 18th century this voice was almost completely neglected. This neglect, unfortunately, extended to much of Purcell's music, which could not be properly performed by other voices. The present renaissance of the counter-tenor voice has brought to light music which has not been performed for centuries.

Mr. Deller began singing as a boy soprano in his parish church, until, at the age of sixteen, his voice settled into the counter-tenor range. As a counter-tenor he sang in the Cathedrals of Canterbury and St. Paul's and in the early 1940's began a career as a soloist. Even before the very successful American tour of the Deller Trio in 1955, Mr. Deller's many recordings of Renaissance and Baroque music had established his reputation in this country.

Desmond Dupre, who plays the viola da gamba and the lute, turned to music as a profession after a war-time career in chemistry. In addition to his collaboration with Mr. Deller, he has given many solo performances on the BBC and in the concert hall.

Robert Conant, harpsichordist, studied with Ralph Kirkpatrick at the Yale School of Music. He has appeared with the Collegiate Chorale, the Dessoff Choirs, and the Rococo Ensemble, and was a member of the Alfred Deller Trio on its first American tour two years ago.

Admission for those who do not have season tickets is \$2 for adults, 75 cents for children, and tickets will be available at the door. Season tickets will also be available at that time.
