BARYLLI QUARTET CONCERT NOVEMBER 25

The second concert in the series for this year will be given by the Barylli Quartet, which consists of Walter Barylli (violin), Otto Strasser (violin), Rudolf Streng (viola), and Emanuel Brabec (cello). The program includes the Quartet in B flat major, K. 458 (Mozart); the Quartet in F minor, Opus 95 (Beethoven); and the Quartet in D minor, Opus posth. ("Death and the Maiden") (Schubert).

Even though this is the first American tour of the Barylli Quartet, their concerts are eagerly anticipated by those who are familiar with their records. The group is thoroughly indoctrinated in the Viennese tradition of string and chamber music playing. Walter Barylli has been concertmaster of the Vienna Philharmonic for twenty years, and his colleagues are also members of this orchestra. In Vienna the Quartet plays an annual series of subscription programs for the Gesellschaft der Musikfreunde, at which time it is known as the Musikvereinsquartett. The group has performed throughout Europe, and in South America; last summer they appeared at the Salzburg Festival.
