BERKNER TALK RE-SCHEDULED FOR JANUARY 15

On Wednesday evening, January 15, Dr. Lloyd V. Berkner will speak on "Earth Satellites." The lecture was postponed in December because of inclement weather. It will be held in the Lecture Hall at 8:30 p.m.

Dr. Berkner was a member of Admiral Bryd's Antartic Expedition in 1928-30 and built the first radio station of the Great Ross Ice Barrier. He was also one of the early workers on the proximity fuse and during the war directed the radar section of the Navy's Bureau of Aeronautics. He is president of the International Council of Scientific Unions and vice-president of its special committee for the International Geophysical Year. At present Dr. Berkner is also head of Associated Universities.

ALBENERI TRIO TO PERFORM TUESDAY

The Albeneri Trio will present the next concert of the BERA series on Tuesday, January 14. As usual, the concert will be given in the Research Staff Lounge, and will begin at 8:30 p.m. The trio, which consists of Ward Devenny (piano), Giorgio Ciompi (violin), and Benar Heifetz (cello), will play the Haydn Trio in E flat major, the Ravel Trio in A major, and the Beethoven Trio in B flat major, Opus 97 ("Archduke").

The Albeneri Trio was organized a dozen years ago, and in the intervening years it has become the foremost piano trio in the country. Ward Davenny, the newest member of the trio, has performed extensively as a soloist and with chamber ensembles. At present he is Director of the Cleveland Institute of Music. Giorgio Ciompi studied with Georges Enesco, and played in the NBC Symphony before he became head of the violin department at the Cleveland Institute of Music. Benar Heifetz was a member of the very famous Kolisch Quartet, and then came to the United States, where he has played in the Philadelphia Orchestra and the NBC Symphony. He has continued to perform with the Symphony of the Air.
