The time has come to put aside such pleasant little films as "The Bed" and "Game of Love" and get a look at an early 1950 French film based on a controversial subject. Andree Cayatte's relentless, exciting attack on the institution of capital punishment is the result of a successful collaboration with the distinguished screenwriter, Charles Spaak.
