## TABLE TENNIS CHAMPS

Suffolk County Table Tennis Champion, Seymour Rottenberg, added another trophy to his mantelpiece when he won the BNL singles title last Friday. An audience of about fifty applauding onlookers witnessed the hard fought match which saw him defeat Joseph Smith (21-19) (21-15) (18-21) (21-16) (21-12) (21-17).

The doubles play was equally as exciting. Steve Garrett and William Lanyi were pressed to the final game by Lloyd O'Laughlin and Alf Christoffersen before winning (17-21) (21-14) (15-21) (21-14) (21-12) (17-21) (21-14).

The singles match pitted two highly experienced performers against one another. The volleying was dramatic and the slams pinpointed and sharp. However, once Rottenberg got rolling he controlled the play with accurate placements and quick changes of pace. On two occasions Smith pulled to five point leads only to have Rottenberg fight back and take the game.

As the scores indicate, the doubles match saw each team go out to a large lead and then coast into victory. The play saw some long periods of volleying, very accurate short drop shots, and some power slamming.

Four of the six contestants in the finals belong to that notorious clique which call themselves Phoubars. Of the winners Rottenberg and Garret both have that distinction.

Trophies were awarded by BERA to the singles and doubles champs and to the singles and runner-up. Mr. J.S. Washburne of the Personnel Department made the presentations.

## MIECZYSLAW HORSZOWSKI TO APPEAR MARCH 11

The distinguished pianist, Mieczyslaw Horszowski, will appear at the next BERA concert on Tuesday, March 11, at 8:30 p.m. Mr. Horszowski has performed here in the past, both as a soloist and in a sonata program with Alexander Schneider, so that he needs no recommendation to those who were fortunate enough to attend his earlier concerts.

His program will consist of the following:

Partita No. 5 in G major . . . . . BACH  
Sonata in B flat minor (Opus 35) . . . . . CHOPIN  
Sonatina Canonica in E flat major . . . . . DALLAPICCOLA  
Sonata in A flat major (Opus 110) . . . . . BEETHOVEN

The list of musicians with whom Horszowski has performed, either as a soloist with orchestra, or in chamber groups, reads like a "Who's Who" of the musical world. For many years he has been associated with Pablo Casals, and he will take part in the Casals Festival in Puerto Rico next summer. He has performed or recorded with Joseph Szigeti, the Busch Chamber Players, the Budapest Quartet, Reginald Kell, and Arturo Toscanini. During the 1954-55 concert season in New York, Horszowski gave an unprecedented series of 12 recitals which included the entire solo piano literature of Beethoven.
