FILM STUDY GROUP OFFERS TWO OUTSTANDING FILMS

On Monday, April 7, the Film Study Group will present two exceptionally fine films both of which are particularly recommended for high-schoolers as well as adults.

WHERE MOUNTAINS FLOAT - This first big Danish color film, an international prize winner, tells of the enterprise of Greenlanders and Danes from kayak to cutter - from a hunting culture to fishing. Bjarne Henning-Jensen, its gifted creator, saw this story naturally in terms of a twelve-year-old boy, his little sister, and the older generation represented by their grandfather. Magnificently impressive scenes of Greenland - grey in rain and white with snow, with every color of landscape, homes and people - are matched by revealing glimpses of primitive children and the life of Greenlanders in turf huts, harbor, shipyard, and ice-filled fjords. In its beauty, real adventure and close knowledge of the people as well as the place, WHERE MOUNTAINS FLOAT is in the Flaherty tradition.

THE BESPOKE OVERCOAT - Exceptional in the field of the short-story film, this Mankowitz version of Gogol's famous tale changes the locale to the East End of London. As the poor brandy-imbibing tailor who helps the ghost of his late friend to take a wry revenge on his former employer, David Kossoff is masterly; and as his friend, the little warehouse clerk, Alfie Bass plays with beautiful precision.

DANCE PROGRAM APRIL 9TH

The final program of the current BERA concert season will be given by Jean Erdman, creative dancer. This will take place in the **Theatre** on Wednesday, April 9, at 8:30 p.m.

Miss Erdman has derived continual inspiration from the Oriental, Primitive, European, and American traditions that were so richly blended in the life of her native city, Honolulu. After appearing as soloist in Martha Graham's company for several years, she felt the need for greater artistic individuality, and left the Graham group to form a school and company of her own.

Miss Erdman's active interest in all art forms facilitated her discovery of beautiful and original settings for her compositions. She has invited many of the boldest modern composers to write her music. Her choreography of Ezra Laderman's "DUET FOR FLUTE AND DANCER" and his "CHAMBER CONCERTO" was acclaimed in a TIME magazine article last year. DANCE magazine cited her work, "THE PERILOUS CHAPEL", as one of the best new works of the 1948-9 New York season. The year before she excited the interest of all critics by her choreography of the dances in the Broadway production of Giraudoux's play, "THE ENCHANTED". (BNL play-goers will remember the local production of this play last year.) Since 1949 she has been a featured soloist at the Annual Arts Festival of the University of Colorado.

Teaching has also been an important factor in the career of Jean Erdman. She has been head of the Modern Dance division at Teachers' College, Columbia University, for two years and at Bard College for three years. In addition, she has her own school of dance in New York.

Miss Erdman's program here will consist of dances set to music of Scarlatti, Mozart, Satie, Bartok, Cowell, Cage, and Poulenc. For those without season tickets admission will be \$2.00 (75¢ for children). Remember, this will be in the Theatre - **not** the Research Staff Lounge.
