90 PERSONS HEAR DISARMAMENT TALK

Last Thursday evening, the Federation of American Scientists sponsored a talk by Dr. William Higinbotham and Dr. Bernard Gregory. They represented the United States and France, respectively, at a two week conference on Disarmament held recently in Quebec. The combined report pointed out how nuclear weapons can cause complete destruction of our civilization today; that nuclear weapons will be used in any major war; and that we must find non-military means of solving international conflicts or perish.

A Russian scientist at the conference suggested an exchange of students between countries to help increase understanding of one nation with another. A report of this conference given by Dr. Higinbotham at Syracuse is being typed and will soon be available for distribution. If you would like a copy send your name and building number to M.
