JAZZ CONCERT

MARIAN McPARTLAND TRIO

MONDAY, JULY 21, 8:30 P.M. - RESEARCH STAFF LOUNGE

Brookhaven's own summer jazz festival is going into its second year with a concert by the MARIAN McPARTLAND TRIO. This group, which was called the best small group of the year by *Metronome* in 1954, promises an evening of jazz unlikely to be surpassed in any of the major festivals on Long Island this year.

Miss McPartland possesses a rhythmic feeling and melodic intuition that combine to produce clean, inventive "progressive" jazz. Here is a post-Dixieland style, not so esoteric as many other groups today.

The trio, composed of piano, bass and drums, has performed on radio and television with Steve Allen, Dave Garroway and others, and has given concert performances at Carnegie Hall, the Palladium Theatre in London and the Salle Pleyel in Paris.

Tickets for the performance will cost \$1.25 for adults and 50¢ for children. They will be on sale at the door on the evening of the performance.
