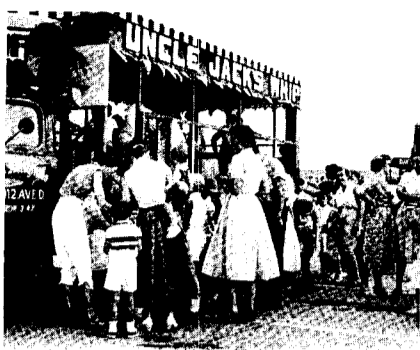

Dorothy Kriedemaher received the trophy for making 33 baskets out of fifty. Pat Bolster was second with 29, Janet Stark and Jan Joles tied with 27 and Dolores Rocklein made 24.

The swimming events held Friday, included the crawl, breast stroke, side stroke, back crawl, elementary back stroke and under water swimming. The children were divided into seven classes with a trophy being awarded to the top man in each class. The winners in each division were: Class A - Tim Hart, Class B - Jon Hart, Class C - John Hostetter, Class D - Dick Reynolds, Class E - Ann Speirs, Class F - Peter Pike, Class G - Tom Smith.

## 3000 WERE THERE

# FIRST ANNUAL GET-TOGETHER HUGE SUCCESS

BERA's operation get-together started with a low rumble at 2:00 p.m. and ended with a loud roar of approval at 9:00 p.m. The last rays of daylight sent home 3000 happy partygoers that had been plying with large quantities of food and entertainment. Old Man Weather combined with the festivities to produce a day that will be long remembered in the history of Brookhaven.

The success of the endeavor was due to a small group of men and women who toiled for two months to establish the format for the affair. Led by GEORGE SABINE and MARIANNE KUGLER of BERA, assignments were made and initial preparations started. JOHN GORR of the Reactor used his boisterous techniques to the fullest extent to publicize the affair. PAT TOWEY of Physics began ticket distribution five weeks before the festivities. As the fateful day drew closer nail biting increased among the committee members and nerve pills were being dispensed freely.

Ticket sales ended a week before the affair and, to the amazement of many people, almost 1500 adult tickets were sold. This set the stage for JERRY SADOFSKY of Metallurgy to begin his culinary activities. Small orders were placed for 1800 lbs. of hot dogs and hamburgers, 1100 dozen rolls, 240 doz. ears of corn and 500 lbs. of beans. Finally, under a full head of rocket fuel, operation Get-Together blasted off on Saturday, July 26. At 2:00 p.m. the beer began to flow, under the direction of DON DAVID, the athletic contests started, and BOB ANDERSON raised his dulcet tones welcoming everyone to BERA's FIRST ANNUAL GET-TOGETHER.

The children didn't know which way to turn first. At one end of the open area to the west of the gymnasium they found pony rides and a sprinkler area. At the other side long lines lined up before the Whip and Ferris Wheel. And finally, cartoons were being shown in the Lecture Hall. A full days fun was assured.

Through all the preparation for the children their elders were not forgotten. HARVEY MARSHAK prepared an excellent fare of dipping the doll in the pool and tossing balls in a barrel. Suitable prizes were awarded for successful partakers in the aquatic and baseball sports.

A few lost adults were returned to their children through the efforts of ALF CHRISTOFFERSON on the mike and MARLENE SCHMIDT at the Information Desk.

Almost 120 party-goers gave of their time so that others could eat. They worked hard and long. The final success of the festivities can be laid in no small part to their efforts.

At 5:00 p.m. a western atmosphere permeated through the crowd as WILLIE HIGINBOTHAM and his Wicked Five supplied Square Dancing for the next hours to the cry of "Take your partner 'round and 'round, Hi-Di-Hi and a Ho-Di-Ho.

Broadway came to Brookhaven at six as SONNY MANNINO and his seventeen piece orchestra supplied their inimitable style of music until darkness brought an end to a wonderful day.
