"THE VIRTUOUS ISLAND" - WITH BEER -



To be presented in the flesh at the Recreation Hall on-site, on the night of Thursday, August 28, this one act play by Jean Giraudoux offers a pleasant evening of theatrical diversion. The play is considered "gently satirical", but many will find it hilariously amusing.

The locale is a south sea island in the year 1769. Captain Cook's ship, THE ENDEAVOR, "puts in" to land an expedition whose aim is to "observe" the transit of the planet Venus. The commander of the vessel, being cognizant of the social problems which sometimes arise when there is intermingling of "civilized" and "uncivilized" peoples, designates the expedition's married taxidermist as the proper person to precede the main landing. His job is to make the island safe for British decency by instructing the natives in the essentials of British morality. The commander is prejudiced on the subject of fraternizing.

Ralph Segel will direct the play, utilizing, in the cast the abundant talents of summer visitors. The play calls for 14 name parts plus all the "extras" who can be packed on stage. The greater part of the cast consists of the simple, uninhibited, uncivilized, island natives, who, surprisingly, speak good English. No grunting whatever!

The names of the cast and crew will be published next week.

Instead of giving away free dishes to lure an audience, Ralph has come up with a brilliant, sure-fire gimmick based on years of intense research devoted to finding out how to please BNL personnel.
