The BERA concert group has arranged a series of five concerts this season. In addition, there will be a children's concert by John Langstaff, baritone, on Saturday morning, November 8. In his chosen specialty as ambassador of music for children, he has held an audience of 4,000 youngsters enthralled in Constitution Hall in Washington and induced thousands more in Montreal to join with him in Sea Chanteys. (Mr. Langstaff is additionally qualified for his work by virtue of his domestic status as the father of four.) Admission will be 75 cents per person, regardless of age. ### **TRIO DI BOLZANO - October 15**

## 75 DAY NO-INJURY RECORD TERMINATED

The eighth disabling injury of 1958 occurred on September 15 when a member of the Hot Lab Division fractured a finger between the two halves of the heavy shielding doors at the decontamination facility. He was unable to work during the next three days, but has now returned and is reported to be healing nicely.

Although these are eight more injuries than anyone would like to see happen, they are twelve fewer than the total recorded at this time last year - twelve people **who were not injured** - a result of the increased emphasis being placed on accident prevention by everyone at BNL.
