TRIO DI BOLZANO

PRESENTS

FIRST BERA CONCERT

In 1956, the BERA concert group sponsored one of the first American performances of the TRIO DI BOLZANO. The audience was so impressed that we have been trying to have them come back ever since. Brookhaven is quite fortunate that the trio will open our current series on Wednesday, October 15 at 8:30 p.m. in the Research Staff Lounge.

The Trio, which is noted for its "bel canto" unity of line, is composed of three individually brilliant artists: NUNZIO MONTANARI, piano; GIANNINO CARPI, violin; SANTA AMADORI, cello. They first played together in 1945. Mr. Montanari and Mr. Carpi were, at the time, both distinguished soloists and both professors at the Conservatorio d'Musica in Bolzano, an Alpine valley town in Northern Italy. Mr. Amadori was a prodigiously accomplished lad of 13. The Trio's members date their combined international activities from 1953, when each gave up a solo career to devote himself exclusively to the ensemble, although they had regularly performed together before the microphones of the BBC in London for several previous years. The Trio has since received universal acclaim in such cities as Paris, London, Rome, Florence, Milan, Madrid, Brussels, Salzburg, and, during a brief introductory United States tour, in Albany, Los Angeles, and San Francisco. The current tour of the Trio takes it, for the first time, coast-to-coast in the United States and Canada.

This is the first concert of a five part series at Brookhaven, and season tickets are available at \$7.50 for adults and \$2.50 for children. Single admission to this concert is \$2.00 for adults and 75 cents for children.

FRENCH FILM FEATURED ON OCTOBER 13

The first film of the fall series will be the comic trilogy directed by Paguol entitled "LETTERS FROM MY WINDMILL." Based on three joyous tales by Alphonse Doudet, they are:

The Three Low Masses in which the devil takes over the body of a dunce who is the sexton for the priest of an ancient chateau where Mass is said at Christmas Eve. In this unsuspected form, the devil so torments the priest with tempting talk about the Christmas dinner that the priest loses himself in gluttony, and there is the devil to pay.

The Elixir of Father Gauchier which started when the good Brother inherited some homemade brew and its recipe from his rowdy Aunt Begonia, and the problem that arises when the good fathers set out to make and sell the wine for charitable purposes provides comedy that is nothing short of hilarious.

The Secret of Master Cornille is the sentimental story of an ancient miller who, for eighteen years, has been pretending to compete with the new fangled steam mills. This is not much in the way of plot description, but it's all we could find.

We also hope to show (not yet confirmed) **Gang War** - a film starkly photographed in a documentary style representing 24 hours of incidents and preparations leading to a teenage gang war on the streets of New York.

All this for half a buck in the Lecture Hall, Monday, October 13, promptly at 8:30 p.m.
