CRACK, SNAP AND POP

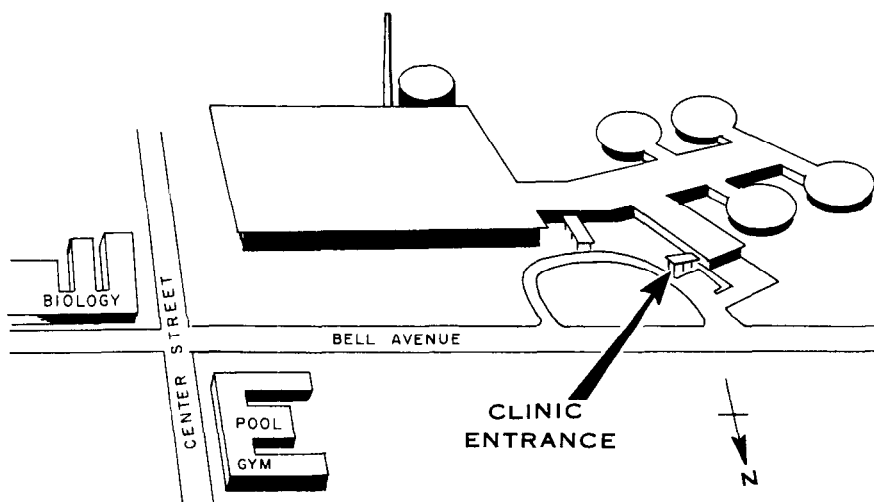
Activity in the Upton Rifle and Pistol Club has changed from stationary targets to live targets for some members as they enjoy the opening of the Hunting Season on Long Island.
