

BROOKHAVEN IN NBC-TV SHOW



Starting Monday, December 1, a camera crew from NBC-TV will be here for several weeks, preparing a one-hour show on the Laboratory, to appear in the Kaleidoscope series. The show will include footage on Brookhaven's programs in biology, chemistry, medicine, physics, accelerators, nuclear engineering, and reactor. A number of Brookhaven staff members will be featured in this show. An announcement giving the time and date of the show will appear in a later issue of the BULLETIN BOARD.

GREEK FILM SCHEDULED FOR DECEMBER 8

In spite of any unkind remarks that may follow, we do pursue a plan in selecting films shown by BERA. We try to present the best that is available in comedy and drama from foreign studios (the best of the U.S. films aren't released for several years). We try to show a bit of everything - with the exception of BB.

December is neo-realist month presenting a drama about a beautiful girl who lives as an outcast in the wheatfields of a backwood region of present-day Greece. Well, the poor thing is hunted and attacked by the superstitious and ignorant villagers, who ascribe their sufferings from plague and crop failure to her. (This is the reverse of an incident in American life - remember the doll that Wm. Kellogg had playing around in his corn fields - popularly known as "The Sweetheart of the Corn?" Regrettably the package has been redesigned in recent years and another bit of American folklore has been lost to our children.) Well, this waif in the wheat is befriended by an enlightened doctor, known to the local villagers as Dr. Egroeg Saiztoc. Unfortunately even he is unable to protect her from the final tragedy at the hands of the townspeople. Noteworthy is the photography with striking views of the hot and lyrical Greek landscape, and the fine unusual score which utilizes Freek folk tunes.
