YOUR FIRE DEPARTMENT SAYS

There seems to be confusion about action to be taken in case of fire or suspicion thereof.

IN CASE OF FIRE OR SUSPICION OF ONE, PROMPTLY PULL THE CLOSEST ALARM BOX, IF NONE NEARBY, DIAL TELEPHONE 313 (FIRE HEADQUARTERS) AND REPORT LOCATION AND YOUR NAME.

If possible, without exposing oneself to the fire, use available equipment to extinguish or hold it in check until help arrives.

Concentrate on getting the fire engines to the scene in a hurry - a little fire becomes a big fire in a hurry.

Promptly report all fires, no matter how trivial, which you may have extinguished without calling the Fire Department. Extinguishers and other equipment must be inspected and replaced immediately after use.

Over the years, our fire record has been excellent, thanks to the splendid cooperation of the staff.
