

BEAUX-ARTS STRING QUARTET

FEBRUARY 5

The Beaux-Arts string quartet will offer the following program in their appearance here on Thursday, February 5:

Quartet in F minor, Opus 55, No. 2.....HAYDN

Quartet No. 3 (1937).....ARTHUR HONEGGER

Quartet No. 3 in B flat major, Opus 67.....BRAHMS

Haydn is a specialty of the Beaux-Arts Quartet. It has undertaken the job of recording 30 of the Haydn quartets this year (about 45% of them).

The concert will be given in the Research Staff Lounge at 8:30 p.m. Single admission will be \$2.00 for adults and 75 cents for children.

RIFI

A French and Spanish film compose the program to be shown in the Lecture Hall on Monday, February 2 at 8:30 p.m. Admission 50¢.

Billed as one of the finest crime pictures ever made, RIFI is the story of a carefully planned, shrewdly executed jewel robbery. Its characters are so carefully developed that you find yourself becoming attached to them, hoping for their success; and later, when a rival gang kidnaps the son of one of the thieves, asking the jewels as ransom, you will be even more in sympathy. The robbery itself is the masterful part of the film: a full 35 minutes without dialog. Each moment and each action is so carefully timed that suspense is built to a supreme height.

MANOLETE - HIS LIFE AND DEATH, produced in Spain, is one of the most complete and detailed films on the life of the great matador. Many bull fights are shown, but even more important is the rare footage of Manolete's personal life.

The present adult and children's swimming courses in our pool are nearing completion. Two new series of instruction will begin as soon as enough people sign up. The classes will be held:


ADULT - Wednesday - 5:15 p.m.
