## BEAUX-ARTS STRING QUARTET TO PLAY HERE THURS., FEB. 5

On Thursday, February 5, Brookhaven will hear the Beaux-Arts String Quartet, a young ensemble which has recently and rapidly become known as one of the finest on the American concert scene.

Gerald Tarack and Alan Martin, violinists, Carl Eberl, violist, and Joseph Tekula, cellist, formed the Beaux-Arts String Quartet during the summer of 1955. Discussions in which Tarack and Tekula participated, at Pierre Monteux summer school for conductors in Hancock, Maine, shaped the idea for the quartet.

After 18 months of arduous rehearsals, the Beaux-Arts String Quartet gave its first concert in the Carnegie Recital Hall. The New York Times commented on the "balanced, entertaining and excellently performed program," the Herald Tribune, on the "skill, adroitness and exuberance" of the performers. In October 1957, the quartet followed up with a three-concert, American-French-German chamber series. Embracing a phenomenal range of styles and schools, it won exceptionally enthusiastic reviews for the Beaux-Arts in the New York Times and in the Herald Tribune plus a full article of praise in The Nation.

The third concert of our season at Brookhaven should be very good. It will be given in the Research Staff Lounge at 8:30 p.m. Single admission is \$2.00 for adults and 75 cents for children.

## LADY KEGLERS COLUMN

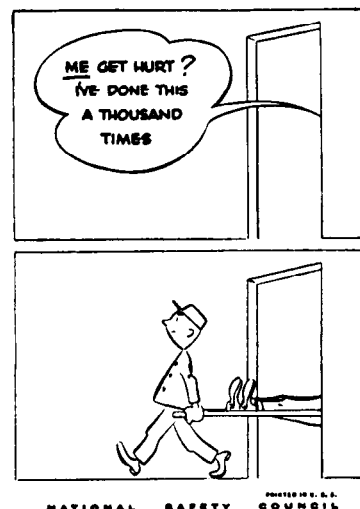
