MEDICAL RESEARCH REACTOR GOES CRITICAL

On March 15, at 9:44 p.m., the Medical Research Reactor achieved criticality for the first time. The MRR has the distinction of being the first reactor to be designed specifically for medical use. The reactor is an integral part of the new Medical Research Center, which includes a 48-bed hospital for research patients and laboratories for studies on medical applications of atomic energy. The Center was dedicated on December 16, 1958.

Following approximately a month of instrumentation testing and the necessary performance studies, the MRR will be available for medical research, and the production of special radioisotopes for use at the Center.
