TABLE TENNIS FINALS



BNL's Table Tennis Tournament comes to an end this week when the final encounters will be staged in the gymnasium on Thursday at 12:00 noon. The singles will pit defending champion S. Rottenberg against the fast-moving N. Porile. The doubles will feature the defending duo of W. Lanyi and S. Garrett against the Biology team of H. Marshall and F. German.

The contestants fought their way to the top of the tournament ladder by vanquishing some stiff opposition. Rottenberg whipped L. Miller while Porile stopped Garrett in hard fought semi-final matches. The doubles saw Lanyi and Garrett defeat Rottenberg and Marcus, three games to two, after being down two games. The other semi-final match produced a victory for the Marshall and German team over L. Lindner and M. Lindner.

The quarter-finals and first and second rounds produced their share of highly competitive table tennis. The heavy response to this tournament points up the growing enthusiasm for the sport among a large segment of the BNL personnel.

LAST CONCERT OF THE SEASON

SUZANNE BLOCH

Wednesday evening, April 15, Suzanne Bloch will give the last concert of the season in our series. Miss Bloch is the foremost lutanist in this country. She has devoted her talents to the discovery, interpretation and preservation of the music of medieval times through the renaissance period. Her interpretation of the music of Shakespears's time is heard every summer at the various Shakespearean festivals here and in Canada.

Miss Bloch will present a general program of Medieval, Renaissance and Baroque music in her appearance here. She will perform music for the lute by Luis de Narvaez, Adrien le Roy, John Dowland and J.S. Bach; music for the recorder by Perotinus, Giles Farnaby, and G.F. Handel; Music for virginals by William Byrd, B. Cosyn, Thomas Tomkins, Hugh Ashton, J.H. d'Anglebert; and present songs to the lute by Guirant de Borneilh, Sebastian Ochsenkrohn, Luys Milan, Michael Cavendish and Robert Johnson, as well as other works by unknown composers of these periods.

The press comments on concerts by Suzanne Bloch have been very good. For instance, after an appearance at the Library of Congress in 1955, The Washington Post said, "An evening of extreme sensitivity, with music so rich that its rarity in concerts remains a continuing mystery." After a Town Hall concert as soloist with the Collegiate Chorale in 1956, the Herald Tribune said, "the presence of Suzanne Bloch, who played the lute and virginals, and sang medieval airs, added mightily to the evening's cumulative charm." Single admission to this concert will be \$2.00 for adults and 75 cents for children. It will be given Wednesday evening, April 15, at 8:30 p.m. in the Research Staff Lounge. Laboratory personnel and their friends are welcome.
