## RECENTLY RELEASED GERMAN FILM NEXT

BNL film-goers will see on July 27 a German film released last month entitled *THE CONFESSIONS OF FELIX KRULL*. Thomas Mann's last novel, whose wit and gaiety belied his age and testified to the robust quality of genius, has been brought to the screen with its charm intact. As the picaresque rogue Felix Krull, part Don Juan and part Machiavelli, the handsome European favorite Horst Buchholz is irresistible. Zaza, one of the many lovely creatures whom Krull enchanted wherever he went, is played by Liselotte Pulver.

The story is a Baedeker of boldness, a richly inventive tour of the follies of man with a disarming scoundrel at the helm of every adventure, from Imperial Germany at the turn of the century to a Paris hotel, backstairs and "front," and an eccentric Professor Cuckoo's household in Lisbon. Never has a rake's progress been more amusingly (and ingeniously) sketched for a sophisticated audience.

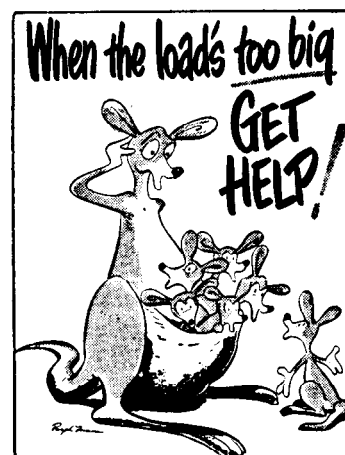
The checker and Chinese checker tournaments were held Wednesday, with Betty Ann Stewart going undefeated to handily win top honors. Martin Sitte was runner-up.
