
NEW PHYSICS BUILDING PLANNED

Work has started on the detailed design for a Physics Building at BNL. It is expected that the design will be completed early this fall and that ground can be broken before the first of the year if a satisfactory construction contract can be negotiated. It is estimated that it will take about two years to complete the construction.

For years the Laboratory administration has desired to consolidate the activities of the Physics Department, which are now dispersed over the Laboratory site in 10 buildings. Authorization to proceed with the design for a Physics Building was received this spring. Preliminary design has now been completed. The site selected for the building is south of Cornell Avenue across from the Cyclotron-Van de Graaff building, with the front approximately at the line of Planck Lane.

As presently planned the building will consist of a two-story office section, containing about 66 single and 50 double offices, four conference rooms, departmental administration offices and a small library. This office section will form three sides of an open court approximately 120 ft x 150 ft. The fourth side of this court to the east of the office section will be a two-story laboratory section which will contain 27 general laboratories, plus special laboratories for the programs in Nuclear Moments, Solid State, Scanning and Data Analysis work for the emulsion and bubble chamber programs in High Energy Physics, computer room and drafting room. Some of these special laboratories will be equipped for work with radioactive materials and shielded from the other laboratories where low radiation background is important. To the east of this two-story laboratory section will be a one-story section containing a shop, works area and several large laboratories to accommodate the type of work contemplated for large operations such as bubble chambers, etc. Mechanical services for the building will be located in a basement under the two-story laboratory section.


The present plans also include a 150seat seminar room which will adjoin both the Physics Building and a proposed Chemistry Building. This seminar room will be connected to each of these buildings by an enclosed corridor.


