"THE STORM WITHIN"

One of Cocteau's best plays, a skillfully written and directed realistic drama about a neurotic and disordered middle class family. It centers around the reactions of an hysterical and possessive mother to her son's love for a young girl. Cocteau here abandons surrealism for realism, creating tense. witty and ironic adult film entertainment filled with penetrating social and psychological observation. Cocteau says: "I wished to try to solve the problem of transferring the theatre to the screen and of filming a play, that is of keeping it intact, walking invisibly among my protagonists while observing their expressions intimately, following them into the rooms and corridors . . . all this would have been impossible without Christian Berard, who makes whatever he touches both real and fairylike . . . I will not speak of the five actors, who, in the end ceased to be actors and became a real family.
