My introduction to the Laboratory staff in last week's BULLETIN BOARD touched me deeply. I say this because I had to pay for the space. Seriously, I'm very pleased to be a part of Brookhaven and I trust that in some small way I can be of service to the staff of the Laboratory.

Having been in consultant work for many years, I believe I can intelligently comment on the overall employee benefits available at BNL. Plans differ in their coverage, since each has been formulated to meet specific needs and economic considerations. Only through examination of the entire program available to an employee can one judge the strength or weakness of a particular plan. The overall program here at Brookhaven is designed to serve the largest number of employees with the greatest amount of coverage.

Our program has four main segments: medical, disability, life insurance, and the pension plan.

Group medical plans are fairly common today, although our parents in most cases were without this coverage. Most of us take these plans for granted, little realizing how important they are until the need for their use arises. A major medical plan, supplementing the basic hospital-surgical insurance, is one of the means through which an employee can be protected against a possible emergency or catastrophe which normally would necessitate an outlay of money beyond his ability to
