REGISTRATION DEADLINE - JUNE 30

Starting the week of July 6 swimming classes for all Laboratory employees' children will be conducted afternoons under the direction of two B.E.R.A. instructors (Gene Collins and Beverly Wellings) with the assistance of our two B.E.R.A. lifeguards (Everett Ramsey and George Petropolis). The pool will be open during the scheduled class periods to ONLY the children who are registered for instruction. Please register early! A program will be arranged based on the returned applications. The BULLETIN BOARD will announce the time and schedule of classes.

IMPORTANT: If there are days your child can NOT attend classes, indicate this on application. No registration fees will be refunded.

SWIMMING CLASSES: 1:00 - 2:30 p.m.

1. These classes are for all Laboratory employees' children.

2. Children must be eight years of age or four feet in height.

3. Each child will be scheduled for a specific period, probably once a week depending on response.

4. A fee of \$2.00 must accompany application. (Make checks payable to B.E.R.A.)

5. Children will report at the Swimming Pool not earlier than 12:50 p.m.

NEW NUCLEAR ENGINEERING BUILDING STARTED AT BNL



Ground was broken Friday, June 12, 1959 for the new Nuclear Engineering Building in an area Northeast of the Hot Lab. The ceremonies were initiated by talks by Dr. Leland J. Haworth, Director, and Mr. Emory L. Van Horn, Atomic Energy Commission Area Manager. The ground-breaking was performed by Dr. Clarke Williams, who has been Chairman of the Nuclear Engineering Department since 1952.

The first phase in the construction of this building, recently authorized by the USAEC, will provide an area of about 38,000 square feet. It will house some of Brookhaven's research activities in the fields of Nuclear engineering, specifically work in chemistry and chemical engineering. A second phase, proposed for a later date, which would accommodate the Nuclear Engineering Department's Reactor Physics and Mechanical Engineering Divisions, and Administration, is still under consideration. When ready for occupancy, the new building will bring some of the Department's many activities together, where research can be conducted in specially designed laboratories.

SWIMMING POOL

The pool does not open for general admissions until 2:30 P.M. daily. Parents bringing children to the Laboratory to swim are requested not to do so before 2:15 p.m. Children will be required to remain in the pool area until picked up by parents.

The Laboratory Administration, and the new B.E.R.A. Board approve a repeat performance of that wonderful occasion last July when about 1500 grown-ups joined, or observed, about 1500 youngsters having the time of their lives in the recreation area, taking part in contests, games, eating, riding, watching cartoons, drinking Coca Cola, eating, running under a sprinkler, dancing, eating, playing, and mingling in an atmosphere of the friendliest possible "gemütlichkeit". The grown-ups were mellowed by childish laughter, music, beer, and places to sit.

It is realized by everyone who attended last year, that an affair of this magnitude requires much PLANNING and much DEPENDABLE manpower. This repeat performance can outdo, in pleasure, the marvelous affair of last July ONLY IF a sufficient number of volunteers will stand up to be counted. The ideal arrangement would be to have enough volunteers for each job so that NO ONE individual need give more than ONE HOUR to discharging his or her duties.

First Step: Planning - It is expected that a planning committee will be called in the near future to be composed of from one to four representatives from each department. These should be people who are really enthusiastic about this family affair, and who WANT to bring ideas, suggestions and/or constructive criticisms to the first meeting. If you are one such, don't hide your light under a bushel. Let your supervisor or group leader know that you would like to attend the first planning meeting. Before this takes place, discuss it with other members of your department or group. Find out how the majority of your people would feel about the best method of dividing up the work - would the individuals each prefer to volunteer for different types of jobs as individuals, or would they prefer that their group or department take over "in toto" full responsibility for one category of work. Example: Last year the major part of buying and serving up the food supplies, and management of the operations was done by volunteers from Metallurgy. Individuals from other departments volunteered to take over one-hour stints, in the operation of beer stations, hamburger stations, ice cream stations, etc., but it was Jerry Sadofsky and his Metallurgy cohorts who planned it, estimated needs,

ordered supplies, saw that they were delivered on time and who supervised the "volunteers".

It is to be hoped that the representatives who attend the planning session will all be of the "volunteer type" - who genuinely WANT to come and help. Again, if YOU want to be in on it, call George Sabine on Ext. 391 and let him know. Also check with your supervisor about his willingness to have you attend the planning meeting. Each department will be expected to send from 1 to 4 people, the larger departments, of course, will send the larger groups.

The general categories into which the work will fall will approximate these:

PROGRAM - Oversee the schedule, announcements.

FACILITIES - (Booths, stoves, storage, fuel, refrigerators, chairs, benches, bandstand. Special marking and roping off areas as required by other committees). Signs, sound equipment, light, bandstands, observation tower, etc.

GAMES AND CONTESTS - Game leaders, starters, helpers, judges, prizes, etc. The BNL Rifle and Gun Club is considering an event for this category.

ENTERTAINMENT - Kiddie rides, ponies, cartoons, bands, canned music, and all the NEW things that you can suggest in this field. Some theatre group members are considering a 20 minute skit.

REFRESHMENTS - Beer, soft drinks, ice cream.

FOOD - Supplies, physical setup, and manpower.

The Planning Committee will elect an Executive Committee. The Executive Committee will appoint Working Committees, the Working Committees will submit their manpower or womanpower needs. Together with a schedule for each post, THEN, volunteers will be sought to fill the posts, and VOILLA! the big day will be here, and the fun will commence!
