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REPORT TO THE STAFF

The annual review of the Laboratory's progress and future took on added significance since Mr. Haworth's recovery enabled him to come in and deliver the address himself on December 23, 1959.

The year had produced several notable gains, including the opening of the Medical Research Center and the start-up of the Cosmotron following repairs and the provision of shielding and additional experimental space.

1959 also saw the beginnings of the new Nuclear Engineering, Physics and High Flux Beam Reactor facilities. In another indication of growth, the number of people on the Laboratory's regular staff passed 2000 in mid-1959.

Mr. Haworth emphasized the continuing growth of the Laboratory's reputation and status, based on the solid foundation of its research activities. Throughout the world, he noted, as well as in this country, Brookhaven is recognized for its meaningful contributions to science. For this, each employee can feel proud of his past work and should look forward to his future efforts that will ensure the continuation of the Laboratory's outstanding record.

THE BNL BUY-LINE



The Purchasing Division provides the services necessary to obtain the goods and services required throughout the Laboratory. Its objective is to provide the required material of the desired quality in the specified quantity, at the proper place, at the right time, at the lowest ultimate cost to the Laboratory.

All buying is dependent upon the receipt in Purchasing of properly approved requisitions. Many factors dictate whether the buying shall be on a cash, purchase order, or contract basis.

Cash purchases are made for relatively low cost items that are available from shelf stocks in the Long Island – New York City area. During the last fiscal year 5300 cash transactions were processed which represented expenditures of over \$130,000.

Purchase orders are written for materiel which cannot be purchased through the cash program either because sources of supply are outside the cash pick-up area, the amount exceeds the self-imposed dollar limitations, or terms and conditions are applied which must be in writing. In the last fiscal year 17,000 requisitions and 20,000 stock cards were referred to Purchasing resulting in the processing of 18,000 orders for which the Laboratory paid out \$8,493,000. 35% of these totals represented purchases for stores items alone.

Contracts are written for construction, alterations, fabrications, and other service requirements and include major items of procurement. Contracts are used when special terms and conditions apply which differ from the standard terms and conditions as stated on the order forms. Last year 55 contracts were prepared resulting in expenditures of approximately \$1,300,000.

In order to provide an orderly flow of information to and from divisions and departments, most of the Purchasing Division contracts are made through the departmental administrative personnel who receive a report listing the buyers to whom requisitions have been assigned. General questions and comments, however, may be referred to Purchasing on any matter pertaining to procurement by anyone who chooses to do so.

In the course of its duties Purchasing is called upon to buy rats and mice (and occasionally an armadillo), straight pins, armor plate from battleships, scissors and remote control manipulators, one-half watt resistors and pulse height analysers, lead bricks and safety shoes, teaspoons and crane buckets, food, feed, and fertilizer, sidewalks and roadways, signs and blackboards, and slide rules and electronic computers.

If materiel which becomes excess to the Laboratory is to be sold, it is referred to Purchasing for the conduct of negotiated or public sale. Items which may be of interest to Laboratory personnel are advertised in the BULLETIN BOARD.

BNL's retirement plan was established to enable its employees to provide for security at retirement age with the financial aid of the Laboratory.

The plan promises you a lifetime income during your retirement in return for the premiums which you and the Laboratory pay in during your working years. All regular Laboratory employees participate in the plan after completing three months of employment and reaching age 30.

The Laboratory's contribution to the retirement plan equals 7½% of each member's base salary. The employee contributes 2½% of the first \$58 of basic weekly (or \$250 of basic monthly) salary, 5% of the next \$23 of basic weekly (or \$100 of basic monthly) salary, and 7½% of basic salary in excess of \$81 per week (or \$350 per month).

The AUI program is an annuity plan. An annuity is a sum of money paid for a given period in return for deposits made earlier. Through annuities many people can pool their resources so that they all may have financial security. Annuity companies, working with large numbers of people, can spread both principal and interest over the life-times of all retired persons no matter how long they live.

The amount of your monthly retirement income depends upon the length of time you have been a participant in the plan, your age when entering the plan, salary level and type of option selected for payment.

In addition to the AUI retirement plan, Laboratory employees are eligible for Social Security benefits. As of January 1, 1960, the employee and the Laboratory each contribute 3% of the employee's first \$4800 of annual earnings.

STATE AND SOCIAL SECURITY TAX CHANGES DUE JANUARY 1

On January 1 and thereafter two tax changes will affect the paychecks of all BNL employees.

The Social Security tax rate for both employees and the Laboratory will increase from 2½% to 3% on all earnings up to \$4,800 annually.

On the same date the New York State withholding tax will drop approximately 25% for each payroll period, although the annual rate of taxation for the State has not changed. When the withholding system was instituted by New York State last April, the State withheld taxes for the entire year during the last nine months of 1959.

Social Security taxes, for both employees and employer, were increased at the beginning of 1959 from 21/2% to 21/2% and the base on which they were levied was increased from \$4,200 to \$4,800. On January 1, 1960 the tax rate will rise to 3% and will remain at that level for 1961 and 1962. After 1962 the rates will increase on a sliding scale to 41/2% by 1969 – with the employer matching the employee's contribution dollar for dollar.

WASTE DISPOSAL

The Health Physics Waste Disposal Group should be contacted for special disposal of non-radioactive hazardous waste, including compressed gas cylinders no longer fit for service. In particular, **nothing** should be removed from this enclosure as some materials may be quite hazardous.
