This is probably the most ambitious play the group has ever done, both in terms of size of cast and the work required behind the scenes, for the sixteen people seen on stage represent perhaps only 25 per cent of the total number involved in the production in one way or another. Four beautiful sets have been built, lighting cables have been strung, hundreds of props dug out of attics, costumes made and mended, and many miscellaneous odd jobs done in order to present to BNL personnel, their families and friends an evening of memorable entertainment.

What is the Theatre Group and what does it do? It is one of the many activities supported by BERA for the enjoyment and recreation of Laboratory employees. **NAVAL RESERVE TRAINING COURSES**

Courses in Personnel Administration and in the Uniform Code of Military Justice will be offered at the U.S. Naval Reserve Training Center, 150-74 Sixth Avenue, Whitestone, Queens, New York, according to an announcement today by LCDR Robert Stankowski, USNR, Commanding Officer of the Training Center. The courses will be presented by personnel from the Naval Reserve Officers School at Freeport, Long Island, New York for Naval Reserve Officers of the Queens and Brooklyn areas.

The courses are open to all Naval Reserve Officers interested in increasing their professional ability as naval officers, advancement in rank and the accumulation of retirement points. The personnel Administration course consists of twenty sessions good for twelve retirement points. The course in the Uniform Code of Military Justice will be offered in two parts, each good for 12 points.

Both courses will start on February 3, 1960 and run through June 1960 at which time the Personnel Administration course, and the first half of the Uniform Code of Military Justice course will be completed. After the summer vacation the Uniform Code of Military Justice course will be resumed.
