SECRETARIAL SEMINAR TO CONCLUDE MARCH 29

On Tuesday, March 29, the second Secretarial Seminar will conclude with talks by Dr. R.C. Anderson, Mr. Joseph S. Washburne, Jr., and Dr. Samuel Goudsmit. Dr. Anderson will discuss the rules and regulations regarding travel, Mr. Washburne will speak on the role of the Personnel Office at BNL and Dr. Goudsmit will give a science lecture. Approximately 50 girls are in attendance at the seminars.

The meetings are designed to aid secretaries and others performing similar duties by informing them of Laboratory procedures and of services available to them. The other meetings in this series were held on March 22 and 24. Among the topics discussed were AUI and BNL organization, security regulations, the telephone and operational problems at BNL, the arranging of conferences and visits, and mail procedures.

CERN PROTON SYNCHROTRON HEAD VISITS BNL

Mr. John B. Adams, Director of the Proton Synchrotron group at CERN, Switzerland, visited BNL from March 22 to 28. The Proton Synchrotron group built and recently brought into operation a 25 BeV accelerator, which is similar to the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron now under construction at BNL.

Mr. Adams conferred with members of the AGS staff and others at BNL. He reported on the status of the CERN machine and outlined the experimental programs planned. On Friday, March 25, he gave a talk in the Research Staff Lounge on proton synchrotron targets and beams.

Mr. Adams was accompanied by Dr. Pierre L'Apostolle, senior staff member at CERN in charge of the Proton Synchrotron's linear accelerator. The two scientists are now visiting the Radiation Laboratory of the University of California at Berkeley.

PHYSICS BUILDING GROUND-BREAKING




Left to Right: L.J. HAWORTH, S. GOUDSMIT, and D.C. MOORE.

Ground was broken on Wednesday, March 23, for the new Physics Department Building. The ground-breaking was performed by Dr. Samuel A Goudsmit, Chairman of the Physics Department. The ceremony was preceded by talks by Dr. Leland J. Haworth, Director of the Laboratory, and Mr. Donald C. Moore, Atomic Energy Commission Acting Area Manager.

The building will be constructed south of Cornell Avenue across from the Cyclotron-Van de Graaff building, with the front approximately at the line of Planck Lane. A contract for the construction of the building has been awarded by the Atomic Energy Commission to the Malan Construction Corporation. The architect engineers are Seelye, Stevenson, Value and Knecht - Urbahn, (Continued on Page 2)

Brayton and Burrows. It is estimated that about two years will be required for completion of the building. Work began on Tuesday, March 22.

The construction of the building will provide an area of about 104,000 square feet, and will cost about \$3,000,000. A two-story office section will form three sides of an open court approximately 120 feet by 150 feet. The office section will contain about 66 single and 50 double offices, four conference rooms, departmental administration offices, and a small library.

The fourth side of the court will be a two-story laboratory section which will contain 27 general laboratories, plus special laboratories for the programs in Nuclear Moments, Solid State, Scanning and Data Analysis work for the emulsion and bubble chamber programs in High Energy Physics, computer room and drafting room. To the east of this two-story laboratory section will be a one-story section containing a shop, works area, and several large laboratories to accommodate the type of work involving such large facilities as bubble chambers.

Plans also include a 150-seat seminar room which will adjoin the new Physics Building.

THEATRE GROUP


