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HAVE A SAFE 4TH

The National Safety Council predicts that there will be 73,000,000 cars on the road during the 4th of July weekend. 7.2 billion miles will be driven by these cars and it is estimated that 370 people will be killed - 13,000 disabled. Last Memorial Day weekend (for most people a 3-day weekend) 367 people were killed.

Speed has been a factor in 7 out of 10 traffic deaths, drink a factor in half of the people killed. Most traffic deaths involve only one car and occur in the evening.

The National Safety Council advises all motorists to make sure that their cars are in top shape before starting out; especially to check the tires, brakes and cooling system of both the car and the driver. Don't drive too far in one day, 400 miles should be maximum. Traffic laws are for your protection and benefit - Obey them -.




Automobiles, however, are not the only source of death and injury during a Holiday Weekend. Last year on the 4th of July, drowning accounted for $\frac{2}{3}$ as many deaths as auto accidents. In New York State 17 people drowned, 14 died in traffic. Know your limitations in the water, as well as those of your family.

INDEPENDENCE DAY HOLIDAY

Independence Day, Monday, July 4, will be observed as a regular Laboratory holiday.

RADIOLOGICAL SAFETY STUDY



Starting on Tuesday evening, July 5, a series of studies will begin at BNL on the evaluation of the Medical Research Center as an emergency fallout shelter in case of nuclear war. The studies will provide information of general use in evaluating structures of this type and will also evaluate the feasibility of temporarily continuing the operation of the Research Hospital in some part of the Center under fallout conditions. The studies will extend for a period of approximately three weeks.


To accomplish the shielding measurements, a radioactive source (Cobalt-60) will be moved by hydraulic means through a series of tubes laid out in planned patterns on the ground surrounding the laboratory wing (east end) of the Medical Research Center and measurement of radioactivity at various points within the building will be recorded. The radiation emitted from Cobalt-60 is in the form of gamma rays, which like x-rays, do not induce radioactivity in any matter exposed to them.

The tests will be confined to the area marked off in the above picture so that routine operation of the Hospital and the Industrial Medicine Clinic will not be affected. Also, the tests will be conducted on week ends and between 5:30 p.m. and 6:30 a.m. on weekdays to minimize interruption of research activities in the laboratory area of the building.

During the times that the radioactive source is being moved through the tubes, a monitoring and control team of Medical, Health Physics and Security personnel will control access to the area. Employees and visitors are requested not to enter the test area after regular working hours **without first registering with the monitoring team.**

The study is being sponsored jointly by the Medical Department of BNL and the Division of Biology and Medicine of the AEC. The firm of Edgerton, Germerhausen and Grier, Inc. of Las Vegas will carry out the project using techniques developed for similar measurements at the Atomic Energy Commission Headquarters at Germantown, Maryland and in various homes and buildings at Oak Ridge, Tennessee.

Shown top to bottom: ADAM F. KIEFFERT, EUGENE LAUER, and ARTHUR L. PENNY


