

LOW TEMPERATURES FOR RESEARCH

Many of the phenomena of interest in the study of the structure of matter can only be investigated at very low temperatures. The reason for this is that the thermal agitation of the atoms at ordinary temperatures is usually sufficiently large to mask the effects one wishes to examine. If the material is cooled to within a few degrees of absolute zero, this random thermal agitation is reduced and the sample is in a simplified state which can be studied experimentally and treated theoretically. Therefore, since the early days at BNL there has been interest in the production of very low temperatures.

During the last century, experimenters succeeded in liquefying one after another of the so-called "permanent" gases until at the end of the century helium finally succumbed and there were no more left to conquer. Since liquid helium boils at -452 degrees F. (absolute zero is -459.8 degrees F.), it provides a medium for carrying out experiments at this temperature or lower. At the present time experimenters in England have succeeded in reaching temperatures of about .00001 degrees above the absolute zero.

From the beginning of the twentieth century until the end of World War II, research in low temperature physics was severely restricted because of the unavailability and high cost of the complex machinery needed to liquefy the gases. Since that time liquefiers based on the design of Professor S. Collins of M.I.T. have become commercially available and are now in widespread use throughout the world.

LOW TEMPERATURES—Cont'd

The original liquefier at BNL was installed in January of 1949 and has undergone several revisions, the latest being in April of this year. At present the liquefier can produce eight liters of helium per hour. The helium is transferred into large metal dewars for transport to the various experiments all over the Laboratory.

The liquefier is housed in a specially designed room in the Chemistry complex and operated by a group of trained technicians, who perform all repairs and maintenance as well as run the machine.

Although the liquefier is operated by the Chemistry Department, the use of liquid helium is by no means restricted to it. For example, the nuclear alignment experiment being carried out by the Physics Department makes large use of liquid helium. Similarly, many groups doing neutron diffraction at the Reactor make use of liquid helium to study the structure of various materials at low temperatures. A helium bubble chamber has also been supplied with liquid from the liquefier. Optical spectroscopy has been done at liquid helium temperatures. The use of low temperatures at Brookhaven has been steadily increasing and the prospect is for this trend to continue.

DIRECTOR AWARDS TEN YEAR PINS AND CERTIFICATES

The third annual presentation of certificates and pins by Dr. Leland J. Haworth to employees who have completed ten years of service with the Laboratory took place last Wednesday, June 29 at the Brookhaven Center. The presentation was made to employees whose first ten years of employment were completed during 1959. After the presentation, the employees and supervisory personnel gathered for refreshments.

Dr. Haworth gave a brief talk expressing the Laboratory's gratitude to these employees for their years of faithful service and their contributions to BNL's achievements. He briefly reviewed the development of the Laboratory since these employees joined the organization in 1949.

Nearly 100 employees reached the 10 year mark in 1959. Almost 700 pins and certificates have been presented to BNL personnel since 10 year service recognition was initiated in 1957, representing more than one third of the staff.

ADVICE TO THE LOVE LAWNS

Shrubs such as yew, hemlock, and the broadleafed evergreens can safely be planted in July, after the new growth has hardened off, that is, turned from light green to a color matching that of last year's growth.

In general, evergreens should not be planted late in the fall. Transplanting destroys part of the root system and the evergreen top gives off more moisture than the injured root system can supply. If desired, evergreens such as yew, hemlock, and holly types can be sheared at this time. The pruning is not beneficial to the plant and is done solely to remove unwanted growth.

Roses, phlox and other plants that are subject to leaf spot should be sprayed with a fungicide now and resprayed after each rain.

MEET ME IN ST. LOUIS, an all-time favorite musical, is the current attraction at the Westbury Music Fair. It will play until July 17.


