



## NATIONAL RADIO ASTRONOMY OBSERVATORY

The National Radio Astronomy Observatory is our sister installation under AUI. The Observatory, located at Green Bank, West Virginia, was founded in 1956 to further progress in radio astronomy, a modern branch of an ancient science. Radio astronomy is a study of the heavens by means of the radio waves emitted by a wide variety of celestial objects. The largest existing radio telescopes penetrate far into the universe to distances of the order of 100,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 miles. The radio signals from the most distant observed cosmic sources have been traveling at the rate of 186,000 miles per second for approximately 10<sup>10</sup> years, and what is recorded on these instruments actually occurred ten billion years ago. The purpose of the National Radio Astronomy Observatory is to provide the large and precise radio telescopes, receivers, and other equipment needed for the detection and analysis of these signals from outer space.

The size and cost of such specialized facilities, prohibitive for private institutions, are the reasons for Federal Government support of NRAO. The National Science Foundaion, through its contractor, AUI, sponsors NRAO for the use of all astronomers and for the advancement of knowledge.

The NRAO helps to broaden the scope of astronomy teaching and research in the United States, for it provides the means for advanced experiment and observation to visiting scientists from universities that lack large facilities of their own for research in radio astronomy.

At NRAO, AUI has adapted and applied to the field of radio astronomy the plans and ideas developed and employed at Brookhaven. The radio telescopes are analogous in character and in the needs they are meant to serve, to the reactors, accelerators, and other nuclear tools at BNL.

The site at Green Bank, West Virginia, in Deer Creek Valley, was chosen because it met most of the conditions desirable for the successful operation of radio telescopes, huge but extremely delicate instruments The Observatory (Please turn to Page 2)

site has 2700 acres, rolling country which was formerly farmland and woods. The valley is sparsely populated, thus reducing the amount of man-made radio interference. The Observatory is rimmed in on all sides by mountain ridges which rise 1000 feet or more above the valley level, shielding the site from the nearer cities. Green Bank is at the same latitude as Washington, D.C. but is 200 miles inland and at an elevation of 2700 feet. The climate is therefore quite different with relatively cool summers, mild winds, and infrequent icing conditions; all of these factors are important in maintaining the unprotected telescopes.

Compared to Brookhaven, the Observatory is a small institution with only about 100 employees in all categories. Because of its isolation, however, it must be self sufficient and many, particularly those in the administrative and management department, "wear several hats"; that is, they have multiple duties and responsibilities.

The principal operating facility at the Observatory at the present time is the Howard E. Tatel 85-foot Radio Telescope, completed in 1959. A 140-foot telescope is now under construction.

Green Bank is about 30 air miles west and slightly south of the Navy's station at Sugar Grove, where a 600-foot telescope is being constructed. Although the basic missions of the two institutions are quite different, the technical problems are similar and there has developed a pattern of informal, friendly cooperation, even to sharing some of the members on the respective Visiting Committees.

Perhaps the research activity which has received the widest public attention is Project Ozma, which was initiated in the Spring of 1960. In this project, the 85-foot telescope was aimed at two nearby stars, in man's first calculated search for messages from other worlds. These stars were selected because they have characteristics similar to our own sun and thus there is a greater chance of their having similar planetary systems, on one of which might be intelligent life. No positive results were obtained from the initial observations and Project Ozma has been temporarily displaced by other research programs requiring observing time on the telescope.

It is planned to feature articles on various scientific projects at the NRAO in The Bulletin Booard from time to time. The present article will be followed by an article on radio colors, written by a member of the staff at the Observatory.

#### RECORD COLD IN BNL ANNALS

In the wee hours of last Sunday morning, the mercury dipped to  $-22.8^{\circ}$ F, the lowest temperature ever recorded since the BNL Meteorology Group began keeping weather records in 1947. The previous low temperature was  $-14^{\circ}$ F recorded December 1950.

During Thursday night and Friday morning's storm, a total of 13 inches of snow was dumped on BNL. Extremely strong winds with gusts up to 48 miles per hour occurred during the storm and produced snowdrifts of 5 feet in some areas of the Laboratory site. A snowfall of this magnitude is rather unusual for January, as this is only the second snowfall of over 10 inches to occur in any January during the past 14 years at Brookhaven.

Extremely cold weather followed the snowstorm with a minimum temperature

of  $-7.2^{\circ}$ F in the early morning of the 21st, followed by the record breaking reading on Sunday, the 22nd.

#### **BROOKHAVEN LECTURE SERIES**

The Third Brookhaven Lecture was given on Wednesday, January 11, by Dr. C.H.W. Hirs of the Biology Department. Dr. Hirs' talk, entitled "Inside the Protein Molecule," described the structure of these molecules which are of importance in the dynamic processes of our body and in its structure. An example of a protein in the former category is hemoglobin which transports oxygen to and from the lungs; an example of the latter is hair which is composed of the protein, keratin.

A combination of physical and chemical studies has led to a fairly good picture of the protein molecule. These structure studies are beginning to allow biochemists to understand how nature can produce these different properties. Dr. Hirs also discussed many other types of protein.

The next Brookhaven lecture will be given by Dr. Gerhart Friedlander on February 15 at 8 p.m. in the Lecture Hall. His title will be "Nuclear Chemistry Research with the Cosmotron."


