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BIOLOGY SUMMER CONFERENCE

The 14th annual summer conference sponsored by the Biology Department was held June 5-7. The theme of the symposium, "Fundamental Aspects of Radiosensitivity," attracted more than 100 participants from various parts of the U.S. and other countries. Papers were presented on radiosensitivity at the molecular level, cellular and tissue levels, mammalian and plant responses to radiation, and the nuclear factors affecting radiosensitivity. Printed reproductions of the papers will be available in about six months.

A similar symposium topic was used several years ago, but the accumulation of new ideas and data deemed a repetition beneficial. Questions which were discussed dealt mainly with the factors that control or influence radiosensitivity.


ORDER BLANKS AGAIN AVAILABLE

BROOKHAVEN HIGH FLUX BEAM RESEARCH REACTOR PATENT PENDING


If Brookhaven National Laboratory were in the nuclear reactor manufacturing business, the High Flux Beam Research Reactor (HFBR) would be imprinted with the well-known phrase "Patent Pending." This would be legally correct because an application has been filed with the United States Patent Office for a patent covering the inventive features incorporated in this new research tool. In the top photograph the inventors of this reactor are shown with each one receiving the honorarium paid to every BNL inventor when he signs a patent application for the Atomic Energy Commission. This group of five establishes a BNL record since it is the largest group of co-inventors thus far to apply for a patent here.

The HFBR, on which construction is expected to start during the summer of 1962, will operate at 40 million watts of heat, or twice the power level of the Graphite Research Reactor, housed in the familiar building on the hill. It will be housed in a hemispherical dome located to the southeast of the reactor stack. This new research tool will provide a peak thermal neutron flux at least

30 times greater and epithermal neutron fluxes about two orders of magnitude larger than those now available at the Graphite Research Reactor. With these greater neutron fluxes, research scientists at BNL will be equipped to carry out experimental programs not presently possible.

The new reactor will uniquely combine the features of (1) a compact, enriched-uranium core, (2) a heavy water coolant and moderator, distributed to produce a thermal neutron flux which is at a maximum in a zone external to the core, with (3) beam tubes which do not penetrate the core but approach the core tangentially within the zone of the maximum thermal neutron flux, and (4) control rods arranged external to the core to result in minimum perturbation of the thermal neutron flux at the beam tubes.

Because of this unique arrangement of the reactor components it will be possible to provide in each external beam a neutron flux which is without equivalent anywhere. Not only will the external thermal and epithermal neutron fluxes be higher than previous available, but each external beam will be of outstanding purity, with contamination by very high energy neutrons and gamma rays greatly reduced below the level normally found in such beams. To the research scientists, minimum contamination of the thermal neutron flux can often be as important as a higher thermal neutron flux.

ANSWER TO CHESS PROBLEM

SAFETY RECORD — CORRECTION


Last week we reported two disabling accidents at BNL in May and described both accidents. One described an employee falling into a trench. This did happen but no lost time was involved.
