Refreshments will be available in the Research Staff Lounge following the lecture.


THEATRE GROUP NOTES

ATOMS AT WORK



A unique portable building (in photograph) houses the USAEC "Atoms at Work" exhibit which is currently touring South American capitals. The exhibit was shown in Buenos Aires from early November to mid-December, 1960, and will next visit Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in May, followed by stops in Caracas, Venezuela, and Lima, Peru.

The USAEC exhibit in Buenos Aires was part of Argentina's Sesquicentennial Exposition. The Exposition was opened by President Arturo Frondizi, and was visited by a group of Governors from the U.S. who were making a tour of South America.

A pool-type gamma facility designed and built at BNL is part of the exhibit. J. Weiss, B. Sylvester, and O. Kuhl of the Nuclear Engineering Department went to Argentina to help set up the facility and direct its operation.

One of the most interesting features of the exhibit is the portable, pneumatic building which houses it – a vast, double-domed, vinyl-coated nylon structure covering a ground area of 300 by 126 feet; rising 65 feet high at the topmost point of the "roof" line, and supported entirely by air. The structure consists of two graceful domes connected by a narrow waist, with air-locked revolving doors set in arched openings at both ends.

The shape of the building is maintained by air pressure in the 4-foot space between its double compartmented walls, and the structure is held up by the pressure of the air within it. The pressure is sustained by blowers which keep it at seven one-hundredths of a pound per square inch above the normal atmospheric pressure – not enough for exhibit visitors to notice.

The exhibit is introduced by an unusual color motion picture – really three films in one – shown on three 12-by-16 foot screens simultaneously, in a theater accommodating 300 persons. The screens are mounted side by side to

create one tremendous viewing area. The 10-minute film, produced by Frances Thompson, Inc., of New York, was filmed in part at BNL. The film introduces atomic energy in its simplest aspects and explains, in broad terms, the many peaceful applications of atomic energy – in power production, in industrial processes, in agriculture, and in medical diagnosis and therapy.

The exhibits include several operating nuclear devices, among them an isotope-producing training and research reactor and the pool-type gamma irradiation facility from BNL.

The reactor is a portable version of the LNP training reactor. This 10-kilowatt reactor is used for the production of short-lived radioisotopes for medical and physical research; for training of engineers and scientists, and for demonstration in connection with seminars arranged for groups of science teachers and students in the various countries visited. The device is housed in a large transparent plastic bubble so as to permit the public to observe the operations without disturbing the scientists working within.

Adjoining the reactor area is the gamma irradiation facility. It consists of a large tank of stainless steel, embedded in the floor and filled with water, which acts as a protective shield for the 2,000-curie radiation source – four slender strips of radioactive cobalt, each 14 inches long. These metal plates emit radiations capable of effecting changes in materials of many kinds; biological and entomological specimens, plastics, foods, and other substances.

The exhibit includes a huge lecture-demonstration area, divided into four large bays, each devoted to a different field of activity in which atomic energy is widely used; nuclear power production, industrial applications, agricultural research, and medical applications. A mechanical manipulator, used for working in a hot cell, is part of the exhibit.

A large area devoted to research and study has been set aside in the "backstage" portion of the exhibit building, remote from the public area. In this area are a technical information center including a scientific and technical library, and a technical film library. Also present is a large classroom, complete with lecture and demonstration facilities, for seminars.

The reactor and gamma facility in the South American exhibit are staffed in part by young scientists of the host country, many of whom are being given their first opportunity for actual use of such equipment. All are given a specially prepared course covering both theory and practice in the use of research reactors and gamma-ray facilities.

A gamma facility similar to the one now touring South America was exhibited in New Delhi, India, from December 1959 to February, 1960, as part of the World Agricultural Exposition. The gamma pool was later given to the Indian Government by the U.S. State Department under the Atoms for Peace Program, and is being used at the Indian Atomic Energy Establishment at Trombay. The pool facility now touring South America was shown at Cairo during the month of May, 1960.

TICHMAN TRIO

The fourth concert in the BERA Concert Series will take place Tuesday evening, Feb. 21, at 8:30 in the Research Staff Lounge. The featured artists will be the Tichman Trio, consisting of Herbert Tichman, clarinet; Ruth Tichman, piano; and Ray Schweitzer, cello. This young and interesting group has concertized throughout the U.S. and has been well received wherever they have performed. The N.Y. Times wrote "the Tichman Trio is a welcome addition to the concert life of this city," while the

Herald-Tribune thought they "played with steady musicianship and intelligence."

The program will consist of Beethoven's Trio in B-flat Op. 11, three pieces from Op. 83 by Max Bruch, the Trio by Robert Parris, and Brahms' Trio in Aminor Op. 114.

Single admissions will be \$2.50; children (including high school students) \$.75.


U.R.P.C.

Hurry with your entries – only 80 teams can be accommodated. Remember – you don't have to be a bowler to enter.

- 1. The Tournament will be held at 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, March 11, 1961 at the Patchague Bowling Center.
- A team shall consist of two bowlers, one male and one female. At least one member of each team must be a BNL employee (per BERA definition).
- 3. The Tournament shall consist of three games per bowler, bowled across six lanes.
- 4. Handicap (per bowler per game) shall be 70% of the difference between the bowler's average and 180, with averages used as follows:
 - a. Bowlers in BNL League this season; use BNL average as of 2/9/61.
 - b. Bowlers not in BNL Leagues this season who bowled in other leagues or who bowled in BNL League last year: use highest sanctioned average this season as of 2/9/61 if available; if not use highest sanctioned average at end of 1959-60 season.
 - c. All others: use score of first game for first game average; use scores of first two games divided by 2 for second game average; use scores of first three games divided by 3 for third game average. Maximum handicap allowed is 45 pins.
- 5. Prizes (based on high team gross series, including handicap). The following are guaranteed for the minimum number of tournament entries (20) – additional prizes will be awarded to teams or individuals, based on the total number of entries.

1st Place Team – two trophies and certificates for two custom fitted bowling balls.

2nd Place Team – two trophies and certificates for two pair of bowling shoes. **3rd Place Team** – two trophies and certificates for two bowling ball bags.

- 6. Team entry fee, including the cost of the bowling, is \$5.00. Entry blank and fee must be presented at the Recreation Office not later than March 3, 1961.
