TWELFTH BROOKHAVEN LECTURE

On December 13th, Dr. Lewis K. Dahl of the Medical Research Center gave the Twelfth Brookhaven Lecture, entitled Excessive Salt Intake and Hypertension: a Dietary and Genetic Interplay." Dr. Dahl emphasized that hypertension (high blood pressure) with its complications is among the leading causes of death in Western society. On a worldwide basis, the incidence of hypertension seems to vary with the average amount of salt in the diet. In our civilization most individuals ingest many times more salt than their bodies need for proper function, and Dr. Dahl showed that this taste for salt is acquired as a cultural habit.

In laboratory rats, the feeding of excessive salt can produce hypertension, and both the incidence and the severity of the disease increases as the amount of extra salt increases. It is primarily the sodium ion of salt (ordinary sodium chloride) that is the culprit, and studies with radioactive Na²² suggest that patients with hypertension retain more sodium in their tissues than do people without hypertension. However, just as with humans, only some rats are sensitive to salt while others retain normal blood pressure despite great excesses of dietary sodium. This tendency to develop hypertension from too much salt apparently is inherited because breeding experiments with stock laboratory rats have isolated strains that are especially sensitive to salt and others that are resistant to it.


