During the early part of February an election will be held to fill three positions on the Executive Board of the Brookhaven Employees' Recreation Association.



SACLAY NUCLEAR RESEARCH CENTER

The concluding articles in the BULLETIN BOARD'S current series on Brookhaven's fellow atomic research laboratories will be devoted to the institutions of other countries. Beginning this final set of stories is the following description of the French Atomic Energy Commission's Saclay Nuclear Research Center (SRNC).

Although major strides in the dawning nuclear science were made in France prior to World War II, the country conducted virtually no atomic energy research during the war. When the French Atomic Energy Commission was established by the government in 1945, it therefore – unlike its counterparts in Great Britain and the United States – had no reservoir of trained personnel, facilities and scientific know-how on which to draw. The task of the new Commission was to lay the foundations for an atomic industry that was then non-existent: it had to train the first research workers and engineers and place at their disposal everything they needed for their work in the way of laboratories, equipment and raw materials. By 1948, however, the first reactor in France, "EL 1," went into operation at the old military fort of Chatillon, near Paris. In 1952, the Saclay Nuclear Research Center, the first permanent research installation established by the Commission, went into operation.

Today, Saclay is the principal nuclear research and instruction center of the French AEC. Its research programs are centered around the use of five particle accelerators and five experimental piles, or reactors. In the former group are two electrostatic accelerators of the Van de Graaff type, a 25 Mev cyclotron, and a 28 Mev linear accelerator. The fifth particle accelerator is a 3 Bev proton synchrotron, "Saturne", which achieved criticality in 1958.

The initial reactor established at Saclay was the "EL 2," the first pile ever cooled by gas circulated under pressure. In addition to its use as a research (Continued on following page)

tool, EL 2 also produces radioisotopes and plutonium. Other reactors at SRNC are the "EL 3", designed for research on high neutron fluxes, and three research reactors of zero power: the "Aquilon", which facilitates neutronic research concerning natural uranium-heavy water; "Persepine", a homogeneous plutonium reactor designed for the study of critical masses of fissionable material; and "Alize", an enriched uranium-light water reactor.

Several large scientific divisions of the French Atomic Energy Commission conduct basic and applied research at Saclay in all aspects of physics, as well as in metallurgy, chemistry, biology and medicine. The Division of Physics and Atomic Reactors covers a wide area, from reactor and accelerator development, through basic research in solid-state and high and low energy physics, to studies in the electronics field. Within the Division of Nuclear Materials and Fuels, work is done in chemistry, physical chemistry and metallurgy. Major research is conducted on fuels and moderators for reactors, particularly in the area of refractory metals, and prototypes of fuel elements for experimental piles are created and manufactured by this group. The processes for the manufacture of neutron moderator materials, now used by French industry, were also developed at Saclay by this Division.

The SRNC Radioisotope Service is in charge of the production and sale of radioactive isotopes to industry and other research institutions. Currently, the Service is able to meet 90% of the French demand and to export approximately 30% of its production.

The Saclay program in the field of biology is concerned chiefly with basic research on the effects of ionizing radiations on elementary structures, cells, and superior organisms. Its activities also extend to various problems of applied radiobiology in radiotoxology, agronomy and medicine.

Utilizing the "Saturne" synchrotron and the linear accelerator, scientists at Saclay are also engaged in basic research in thermonuclear fusion.

In addition to the research and development activities outlined above, SRNC also plays the role of a nuclear university through its Institute of Nuclear Sciences and Techniques (INSTN). INSTN, created in 1956, offers courses to scientists and engineers of all countries. Its program includes courses in metallurgy, atomic engineering, accelerator theory and techniques, radiobiology, and reactor operations.

Daniel Abrams, pianist, will be the featured artist. In his second appearance at Brookhaven, this outstanding young American musician will perform works by Scarlatti, Mozart, Schumann (Faschingsschwank), Beethoven (Waldstein Sonata), and Chopin.


