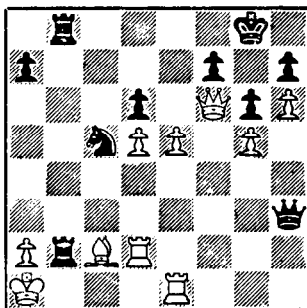

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

At a meeting of the Bowling Executive Board on March 1, several actions were taken. Another Special Events Night will be held during the week of March 26 (details in next week's BULLETIN BOARD). The second Mixed Doubles Tournament of the season is scheduled for May 12 (details to be announced in April).
