## BERA FILM SERIES SPECIAL BONUS MOVIE

### March 22 Lecture Hall 8:30 p.m.

"The Cow and I" with Fernandel is being shown in addition to the regular schedule. All series ticket holders will be admitted free – tickets will not be punched.

In "The Cow and I" Fernandel acts out a gentle account of a prisoner-of-war escape story. The escape has almost a classic simplicity. A French soldier, held in a German prison farm, takes one of the cows and a milk pail and walks the cow 400 miles to the border. This bucolic little comedy includes reflections on the absurdities of war, but for the most part it is content with the humors of Fernandel's affection for his bovine co-star.

### FIFTEENTH BROOKHAVEN LECTURE

On March 14, Dr. A.O. Allen of the Chemistry Department gave the Fifteenth Brookhaven Lecture. His subject was the radiation chemistry of aqueous solutions. High-energy radiation decomposes aqueous solutions into hydrogen and hydrogen peroxide, which are characteristic of the water, and the radiation also causes reactions of the solute far out of proportion to the amount of solute present. The amounts of these products depend upon the radiation quality. Alpha particles produce much more hydrogen and hydrogen peroxide and less reaction of the solute than do gamma rays.

A theory which explains these facts is that the radiation causes the water molecules to break up into fragments, called free radicals. These free radicals are formed in small clusters containing about ten radicals. As they diffuse away from the region in which they are produced, some of the radicals combine to form hydrogen and hydrogen peroxide. Others excape this combination and react with solutes present. In the case of densely ionizing radiation, such as alpha particles, these clusters are produced close together and more of the radicals combine to give products.

The reducing free radical, which leads to hydrogen formation, has a unit negative charge, as was shown by add-

ing inert salts to certain solutions. This identifies this free radical as a "wet electron." It is apparently an electron that is stabilized by the positive dipoles of the water surrounding it. The oxidizing free-radical does not have any charge and is apparently an hydroxy radical, OH.


### **SPECIAL EVENT**

Mr. and Mrs. Verdin, winners of the March 8 game, showed good duplicate strategy in reaching 3NT on this hand:

Mrs. Verdin as dealer opened the West hand with 1C; after a pass by North, Mr. Verdin made a very wise choice with a bid of 3C. His reasoning was that if partner bid 3NT, it would probably be makeable. If partner chose to go to 5C (which might be off three top tricks), the opponents were probably cold for 4H. Although the 3C bid was a lie about the hand's high card strength, it did achieve its purpose of convincing South to stay out of the bidding. Mrs. Verdin steered into the excellent 3NT spot and made 9 tricks. And all the while N-S remained unaware that they had a breezy 10 tricks at a heart contract.
